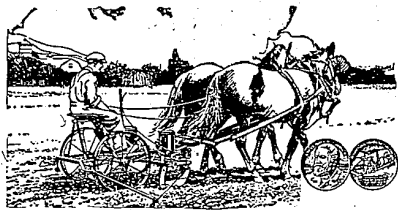

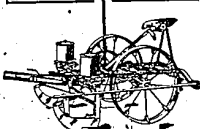

"PREBAIT" RATS BEFORE FEEDING THEM POISON

Feeding rats good food for several nights before attempting to poison them is a subterfuge recommended by the home economics extension service at Michigan State College, East Lansing.

"It is a good idea to 'prebait' them," that is, use various mixtures without poison for a night or two, and then set up poison stations where the rats are known to feed and live in and around homes and barns," department members say.

Poison mixtures should be varied because rats become wary of any one food. Bait may be spread on small round cardboard or put into paper bags with the tops tied. All food should be kept in secure containers, and the greatest care is urged that nothing attractive to rats is left about. Pets should also be kept out of the way when the poison mixtures are used, although the poison is not fatal to them.

Three mixtures recommended by the department are: one ounce red squill over-dried powder, 15 ounces lean hamburger meat, one ounce corn meal; one ounce red squill, 15 ounces salmon or mackerel, one ounce oatmeal; one ounce red squill and 16 ounces cornmeal. The dried powder should be mixed with the cereal before adding the meat or fish. Sufficient water should be used to make it sticky.

Power to impeach To impeach a public officer is to bring accusations of crime or misdemeanor against him and call him to account before a competent tribunal. Article I, Section 2 of the Constitution gives the house of representatives the sole power of impeachment and Article I, Section 3 gives the senate the sole power to try all impeachments. Andrew Johnson was the only President to be impeached by the house of representatives; he was tried before the senate but acquitted as less than two-thirds found him guilty.

Convicts Rule Russian

Camp, Get Good Results

Two years ago 18 criminals were brought to a small and neglected estate near Moscow, says a Moscow United Press correspondent.

At that time peasants of an adjoining village appealed to the central executive committee to remove this "nest of cut-throats" from the region. The peasants were reassured, but the "nest" remained and not a guard was posted.

The young criminal continued to live on the estate and formed a labor commune. For a long time, upon whose initiative the commune was organized, aimed to fight criminality by re-education through work.

During the ten years of the commune's existence, the number of its members grew from 18 to 3,100 men and women. It developed from a few small shops until now a knitting mill and a large boot factory are operating.

As a principle, each member of the commune must remain there for three years. However, an overwhelming majority remain indefinitely. Many of them, former criminals and wafers, now work in the various Soviet towns as skilled technicians.

Re-education of the criminal is an extremely complicated task. The entire educational work is based upon the principles of full confidence (open doors), labor, and self-management. Open doors have kept criminals there as no lock would have done.

Oysters "Grow" on Trees The island of Trinidad, in the West Indies is not only a source of self-drying Pitch Lake, source of most of the world's asphalt and the place where Sir Walter Raleigh caulked his ships, but other peculiarities. For instance, oysters grow on mangrove trees. They fasten themselves to the trees' branches at high tide and are left hanging when the tide recedes. Then, too, Trinidad has its singing fish, which emit a trumpeting sound when annoyed.

Cleaning Parchment Diplomas A parchment diploma may be cleaned if it is not too soiled by rubbing lightly with art gum, which may be purchased from any art dealer. Another method is to use pieces of freshly breaded meat with the crust cut off. For grease spots apply Fuller's earth. Rub it in the stain and then brush out.

Education

Peasant, Burrowing Bean

In the late summer and autumn the nuts are dug up, and then dried in piles of stacks for four to six weeks. Threshing machine remove the pods from the vines.
