Tremendous Trifles

ON a bright October day in 1837 a pig belonging to Mrs. Sherman, a good wife of Boston, wandered into the garden of a wealthy and wealthy gentleman named Capt. Robert Keayne, who killed the wandering porker. Mrs. Sherman sued him for damages and lost a gentleman's court. She had done a lot of talking, so Keayne sued her for slander. He won again.

Then there was turmoil—that part of it composed of the common people.

The case was carried to the legislative assembly, then known as "The Great and General Court." It was composed of the governor, magistrates and deputies from the several towns, but the magistrates, who were gentlemen, although outnumbered, held the balance of power through a rule which said that no act should pass unless approved by the majority of magistrates!

Mrs. Sherman's pig became the symbol of fair play and equal representation for the common people. The controversy raged for seven years. The upshot of it was that, instead of having a single legislative body controlled by a select group of the magistrates, deputies or by a majority vote of all, as the deputies desired—Massachusetts got an assembly of two co-ordinate branches. This was instituted the system of checks and balances later incorporated in the provisions for our national congress and state legislatures.

So Mrs. Sherman's martyred pig, after a century and a half, found an appropriate recognition—a branch of government often noted for "pork barrel" legislation!

FARMINGTON DEFEATS WALLED LAKE 3-2

In a game featured by exceptional pitching, the Farmington High School baseball team defeated Walled Lake High School in the second game played between the two teams this season by the score of 3-2 Tuesday afternoon on the Farmington diamond.

Both Clark of Farmington and Geigler of Walled Lake hurled what was considered by coaches and spectators alike one of the finest high school games seen here. Clark limited the Walled Lake batters to two hits and Geigler allowed the Farmington players but four safe hits. Geigler issued no free trips to first on balls and Clark gave only one. Clark struck out 13 Walled Lake batters while Geigler fanned one.

The Farmington team made five errors while Walled Lake made 4.

Lee Hits Homer

The play of Donald Lee and Harry Linklater was outstanding for Farmington. Linklater perfectly judged several hard liners and fly balls that would have gone for extra bases had he not been playing "heads-up" baseball. To Donald Lee went the honor of hitting the first home run of the season and the first on the new baseball field. He got his four-bagger in the first inning.

Stumpson, by his brilliant play in center field for Walled Lake, was outstanding for the visitors and caught a number of impossible looking balls that would otherwise have been hits.

Farmington scored its first run in the first inning on Lee's homer with no one on base. The second run came in the fifth when Turner reached first on an error and scored on Clark's two-base hit, the last hit made by the Farmington batters. The third and winning run scored in the sixth when Lee was safe on second on a two-base error and advanced when Davis got safely to first on an error and scored on Hunt's long fly.

Walled Lake's runs came in the fourth and seventh innings. The first run was scored by Geigler who got to second on a two-base error and the second by Button who led-off in the seventh with a triple.

Defeat Clarkston

Friday afternoon Farmington defeated Clarkston 4-3 to go into a two or possibly three way tie for second place in the league. Clark pitched for Farmington and, although not as effective as he was in the Walled Lake game, he held Clarkston to seven hits while his teammates were garnering ten from Russell, Clarkston pitcher.

Clark struck out nine Clarkston men and walked six while Russell struck out seven Farmington batters and walked one. Himmelspach led the attack for Farmington with two singles and a double in four trips to the plate. Yost, Clarkston outfielder, got two singles out of four times at bat.

The play of R. Werschin and Harry Linklater on defense and Himmelspach at bat was outstanding for Farmington.
