completely absolved by Detroit police in the death of a skyxar old
boy who was struck by Hinbern's
automobile May 15 on Grand River avenue near Telegraph RoadPolice determined that the tragedy was due entirely to the child's
negligence and that Hinbern was
in no way at fault.

in Redford Receiving Hospital May
21, of Internal injuries suffered
when he was struck six days pretiously. The boy ran through a
