FARMINGTON MAN FARMER - LABOR STATE SECRETARY

W. Allen Nelson of Farmington has taken up his new duties as state secretary of the Farmer-Labor party of Michigan, following his election to that important office in the party councils at a meeting in Owosso Sunday. Election of the Farmington man followed the resignation of Don Allerdice of Jackson, who has heretofore held the office.

Reports indicate that the change in secretaries held deeper significance than merely transfer of one office from one man to another. Allerdice has been the object of attack by a strong faction of the party for some time.

Although reports of the Owosso meeting indicate that Nelson took the secretarialship with reluctance, he has been prominent in the past year with others in the movement within the party against Allerdice's handling of the secretarialship. Nelson against Allerdice is reported by his critics to have become so strong that western Michigan members of the party would not go along with the party as long as he was secretary. At Owosso all state officers resigned and were re-elected, to indicate support of them, but after Allerdice resigned Nelson was elected in his place.

The Farmington man will have a prominent part in arranging for the party's state convention to be held late in the summer.

FARMINGTON MAN IS CLEARED IN TRAFFIC DEATH

Carl Hinbern, 55, of 33613 Oakland Road, Farmington, has been completely absolved by Detroit police in the death of a six-year old boy who was struck by Hinbern's automobile May 15 on Grand River avenue near Telegraph Road. Police determined that the tragedy was due entirely to the child's negligence and that Hinbern was in no way at fault.

The boy, Rupert C. Kimball, 1845 Woodbine avenue, Detroit, died in Redford Receiving Hospital May 21, of internal injuries suffered when he was struck six days previously. The boy ran through a light to Hinbern's machine. Hinbern had no chance to avert the accident.

The lad was the son of Rupert Kimball, 14825 Stansbury avenue, Detroit, and had been boarding at the Woodbine avenue address. Previous to his death, there had been no child traffic fatality in Detroit for nearly four weeks.
