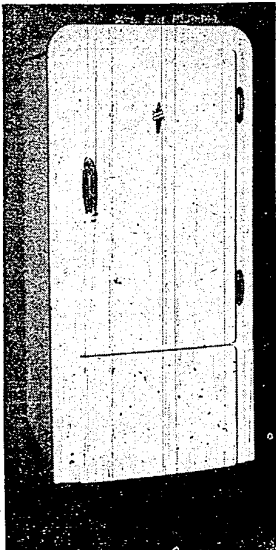

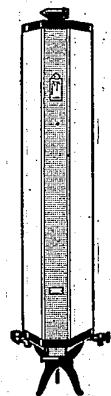

MICHIGAN BELL ACCEPTS CUT CONDITIONALLY

Reductions in telephone rates and charges ordered by the Michigan Public Utilities Commission June 30, is agreed to by the Michigan Bell Telephone Company, which Thursday sent the Commission a letter accepting the order but reserving the right to contest the rates if the returns prove inadequate. The letter, signed by G. M. Welch, president of the Michigan Bell, stated that the company would withdraw its suit now before the U. S. District Court at Detroit, "and thus terminate all existing litigation" in the rate controversy.

The letter asks that, if the experience of the future indicates that the new rates are not to the company, an expeditious adjustment be made, pointing out that the company has been sustained in every court case on the merits of the case during the 25 years' litigation, and holding that there is every prospect that if the case is continued in the courts the company will win sometime.

Although certain of the Commission's findings are objectionable, the Michigan Bell agrees that at least some of the reduced rates are sound in principle, and therefore, "to avoid continuing the litigation," the company will put the entire order into effect giving 75 per cent of the service benefit of all the new rates and practices. This will result in revenue loss to the company, it is maintained, although the loss will be offset partially by the saving rate case expense, with the added benefit of giving the organization freedom, for a time, from the distraction of rate case proceedings.

Particular points on which the company disagrees with the Commission's findings and reasoning have to do with setting the fair value of telephone property used in furnishing intrastate service at only \$145,000,000; the determination of 1.5 per cent as a fair rate of return; the reduction of 3 per cent of the allowance to be set aside for accrued depreciation; the decision that sufficient proof had not been submitted with respect to services supplied under the license contract by the American Telephone & Telegraph Company; and the allocation made of exchange property and expenses as between interstate and intrastate toll service.
