Better have your dog checked by a veterinarian for your dog's protection and for that of your neighbor's dog.

Preventive treatment is available. The vet can determine the urgency. Mosquitoes carry this disease from dog to dog so all during the mosquito season it is necessary to be cautious.

Eighty per cent of the dogs in Franklin Village have been infected. It could be just as serious here unless everyone has his dog tested before it is too late. Please do not let your dog run freely around the neighborhood. It is against the law and it could be a factor in spreading the disease.
