first time this year and so by closing these grades they may receive transportation from the state. Walled Lake had 120 non-resident pupils last year. The Bentley District which is closed brings the entire school to Walled Lake. Communities sending large groups of high school pupils are Wixom, Commerce, Union Lake, West Farmington and Novi. Besides these schools there are ten other districts outside of the consolidated district sending high school pupils.

The seven buses owned by the school will be used only for transporting pupils who live within the Walled Lake district. Three districts that have been sending pupils. Three other districts that have sent large groups of high school pupils are having their high school pupils come in individual cars.

Miss Margaret Heinz of Auburn, Michigan who has had charge of the commercial department for the past six years has been given a leave of absence for the coming school year by the board of education for study at Wayne University and the University of Michigan. Miss Heinz has taught at

Miss Lucille Malcolm of Commerce, Michigan will teach in Miss Heinz's place during the present school year. Miss Malcolm is a graduate of Michigan State Normal College and Cleary College of Ypsilanti and has taught at Vandereock Lake, Jackson County and at Blissfield.
