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THREE FARMINGTON STUDENTS RECEIVE FEDERAL AID

Three students of Farmington High School are now receiving federal aid through the National Youth Administration's student aid program, according to Principal C. W. Tolles.

The high schools and colleges are directly responsible for the administration and supervision of the work done by NYA students.

It is estimated that 14,530 high school and college students in Michigan will receive financial assistance during the present school year. \$851,000 has been made available for the State of Michigan, according to William Haber, state NYA director.

Of this amount \$418,000 will be used to assist 8,000 high school students. Haber states that "these appropriations are not grants but are wages earned by the students for the performance of some useful work under the program."

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
