Water Main Approved as WPA Project

Work is expected to begin soon on a \$1.654 WPA project in Farmington, approval for which was granted this week by the President and WPA officials. The work to be undertaken will be the construction of a water main connecting the two ends at Power and Brookdale averages on Nine Mile Road. The main will join these two dead-ends, making a circulating system, according to Commissioner Emory Hatton.
