RED CROSS AID TO MORE THAN 500,000 DISASTER VICTIMS

Large Urban Areas Devastated As Elements Hit 20 States East of Mississippi

"This stumber of disaster victims assisted by the Red Cross during the fiscal year ended June 30 was more than four times the number aided in the provious twelve mouth period." Admiral Cary T. Grayson, chairman, said in commenting on highlighte o. the animal report just issued. "Over 13.,000 families were given, food.; clothing, shelter and medical care, ignal thousands of homes were rebuilt or repaired by the Red Cross to enable them to carry on." Pointing to the many-aided problems created by the wide variety of types of disasters which occurred during the year, Admiral Crayson said. "The Red Cross sean and reds of trained morkers by care procede of canastrophes which the cude earthquake, epidemic, explosion, fire furgee relief, shipwreck, increade and typhoon. The Red Cross took charge at the scenes of 156 domestic disasters of major severity."

The report emphasized in marked value of Government-Red Cross cooperation, when disaster strikes, giring as example the flight of Army bombing planes, which dropped Red Cross food to maronned refugees at Renovo, Feansylvania, during the Spring floods. More than 10,600 persons were restreated from the second floors of homes in Wilker-Barre and Kings ston through Coast Guard-Red Cross cooperation at the height of these same floods.

"Government agencies and relief groups whee of invaluable as gistance to Red Cross relief forces at all times." Admiral Grayson stated.

The report points out that this figure does not include assistance given in 27 lesser disasters with a total of 2.000 persons aided, and ands that additional millions will be used to "clean up" Spring; foods and tornadoes.

Red Cross Nurses Combat Disease on Wide Front

At the close of the fiscal year ended June 30, there were 673 Red Cross nurses bettering health conditions and earlier for the sick in solution and earlier for the sick in public health nurses cared for a total of 233.61 persons during the year and made more than a million visits on their behalt.

The annual report of the American Red Cross states further that these nurses cooperated with doctors in examining 871,667 school and pre-school children, with 342 sliphysical defects found and curs tree treatment arranged in 203,030 cases.

In 979 Red Cross chapters 1,733 graduate aurees taught Red Cross home hygiene and care of the sick, itsning certificates to 53,126 persons completing the courses. In addition, 1,777 Red Cross reserve aurses were called upon during the year for disaster and epidemic coplició work.
