Mrs. Gertrude Webster was hostess to her bridge club on Monday afternoon.

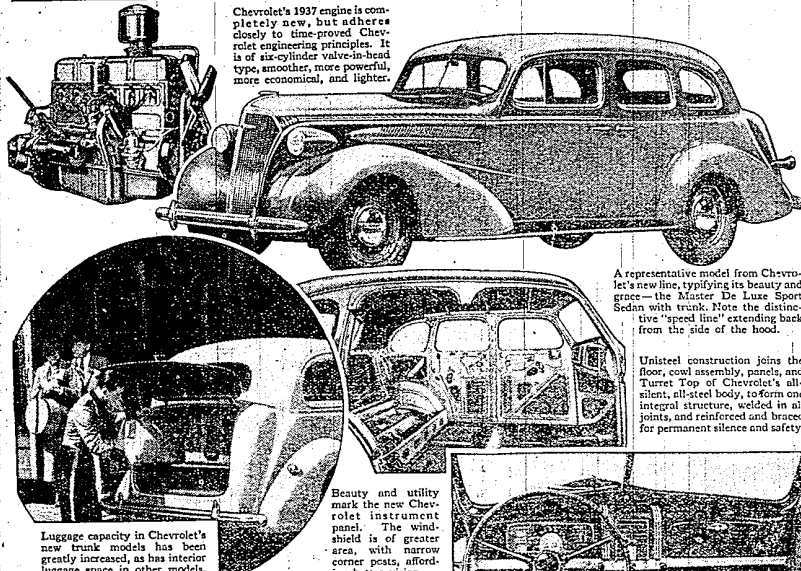
Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Seely were guests of Mr. and Mrs. Robert West of Dearborn on Thanksgiving Day.

**Borneo Has No Calendar**  
Borneo's calendar-making priests erect an eight-foot sun-pole firmly in the center of each district, the shadow cast by the sun used as a time measure, on the same principle as our sun dial. When the sun is directly overhead, they look at the shadow on the ground and scratch along the full length of it while the shadow points north. By ancestral training and experienced observation of the pole's shortening noon shadow, they know when the spring season for plowing and seed time is approaching. Priests peg these dates in secret, hide their shadow rod, and after harvest claim "it" for helping farmers to locate the seasons.

**Aurora Borealis**  
The Aurora Borealis in the northern hemisphere and the Aurora Australis in the southern hemisphere are due to similar causes. The usual theory is that the displays are caused by the encounter of electrons from the sun with gases such as krypton and nitrogen, in the upper rarefied atmosphere. Besides this electrical influence, there is believed also to be some connection with the earth's magnetism and with the frequency of sun spots. Proof of this is that the rays of the aurora coincide with the direction of the magnetic needle, that the needle is disturbed at such times and that a brilliant aurora is often associated with a magnetic storm.
