"KIN" IDENTIFY
MAN; PRINTS
SHOW MISTAKE

Identification by fingerprints has
almost ceased to be news, it is so
commonplace.

But when whorls and twin-
loops on the fingerprints of an un-
identified man upset the funeral
plans made by members of a fam-
ily after their identification, that
finds a place in type.

The Michigan State Police com-
pleted making a fingerprint re-
cord of an unidentified man in an

Epworth League recently as a
couple were brought into the grim
room. They identified the man as
an uncle.

Instead of considering the mys-
tery of identity solved, the state
trooper telephoned the identi-
fication bureau at East Lansing and
asked the classification read-
ing. The preliminary check there
indicated the man to be a former
Eaton county resident and not the
"uncle" that had been identified.

Another "nephew" living in
Oswosso was called. He, too, identi-
fied the man.

As the family went into consulta-
tion with the police, the man
was identified as a former Eaton
county resident but as the father
of the Ossosso family but as the
son of the former Eaton county man
who had reached the state police
through a minor arrest record
made several years ago.

In the first thinning this may wise
be reduced to 300 selected trees.
This permits the remaining trees to
receive more sunlight and grow
much faster.

Another improvement cutting
can be planned in 15 or 18 years

reducing the number to 150 trees
while the final stand may contain

only 60 or 75 mature trees of high

quality for sawing. In the mean-
time, sprouts from stumps will take

the place of the mature trees and

may be selected for succeeding thin-
ning cuttings.

When the thinning is being done,

the trees to be taken out include the crooked, decayed
and bushy topped individuals.

Crooked or short trunked trees

make good firewood but when used

for saw timber they produce more

sawdust and slabs than lumber,

while bushy topped trees usually

contain but one log of inferior qual-
ity.


