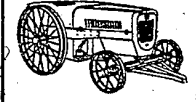

IF YOU want to be elected President, get a slogan! Make it short. And if you can include in it the little of alliteration—do it! "Tippecanoe and Tyler, too!" reminded the nation that Gen. William Henry Harrison had won an important Indian battle at the beginning of a war which was none too well-filled with land victories for the American arms.
