Motion made by Nacker and supported by Hutton that the City of Farmington pay to Farmington High School Band fifty dollars (\$50.00) for music furnished at the American Legion Gala Day 1936. Roll call: Staman, Nacker, Gildemeister, Oldenburg, Hutton. Carried.

Motion made by Gildemeister and supported by Staman that the approval of the purchase of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) worth of refunding bonds, No's 26 to 30 inclusive, due 1943 plus premium of Seventy Seven Dollars and Fifty cents (\$77.50) and incurred interest of Forty Three Dollars and Thirty Three (\$43.33) same to be cancelled.

Roll call: Staman, Nacker, Gildemeister, Oldenburg, Hutton. Carried.

Motion made by Oldenburg and supported by Hutton that George Dewey be appointed fireman to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Walter Lee on account of ill health. Carried.

Motion made by Hutton and supported by Gildemeister that the City of Farmington mail check for Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to the Emergency Welfare Relief Commission of Pontiac to apply on account for the current year contribution.

Roll call: Staman, Nacker, Gildemeister, Oldenburg, Hutton. Carried.

Motion made by Hutton supported by Oldenburg to buy material to install water main on the Nine Mile Road from Powers Ave. to Brinkley Ave. and on Grand River Ave. extending east from Maple Ave. a distance of about five hundred sixty feet (\$60) to improve dead ends. The material to cost approximately Nine Hundred Fifty Four Dollars (\$954.00). Roll call: Staman, Nacker, Gildemeister, Oldenburg, Hutton. Carried.

An opinion from Schulte and Pare in regard to the power the City of Farmington has to cancel a legal assessment and tax was received and placed on file.

Dorthe Baker Is Drum Major of Three Bands

Dorthe Baker, the high school girl from Farmington who moved to Ingewood, California with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Will Baker, and her sister, Gladys Baker Boucher and Little Dolores Boucher, about a year and one-half ago, has gained considerable renown as a drum major at Ingewood.

She holds this distinctive title for the High School Band, the Ingewood Boy's Band and the Southern California Girls' Band. Her niece, little Dolores Boucher, is the mascot for these bands. For these, she is costumed in a tiny drum major's outfit and twirls a small baton.

Miss Dorthe drum majored in the Boys' Band from Ingewood in the Rose Bowl parade on New Year's Day. That was an eight mile march, so she reports. She has appeared twice on the town stage in combination tap dancing and twirling numbers.

When Mr. and Mrs. Baker and family came back to Michigan for the summer of 1936, they lived at their cottage at Walled Lake. At that time Dorthe received her first education in twirling from Miss Mary Louise Worofold, who is the drum major of the Farmington High School Band. Mary Louise was also a summer resident at Walled Lake.

POSTMASTER SOUGHT FOR WALLED LAKE

Applications for the position of postmaster at Walled Lake are being accepted by the United States civil service commission. Open competitive third-class examinations will be held for those submitting applications which must be in by February 5.

The date for the examinations will be stated on the admission cards sent to applicants. It is expected that it will be held around February 20, which is 15 days after the close of receipt of applications.

Rex Tuttle is now acting postmaster at Walled Lake. He was ap-

pointed to that capacity following the recent resignation of Ernest Taylor.

The salary for the position is \$1,700 a year. Applicants must be citizens of the United States, bona fide patrons of the post office for which application is made, for at least one year immediately preceding February 5, 1937. Applicants must be between the ages of 21 and 67 on February 5. These age limits are waived in the case of veterans of the World War, the Spanish-American War, and the Philippine Insurrection; provided that to get the benefit of such waiver, documentary proof of such service must be submitted with the application. Applicants must also be in good physical condition.

The Post Office department will not appoint to the position of postmaster a person concerned in a contract for the carrying of the mails, either as contractor, subcontractor, or surety, or any member of the immediate family of such person, or the husband or wife of a rural carrier.
