LENTEN SEASON LIKENED TO INVENTORY

Describing the Lenten season as a "taking inventory of the spiritual life," Rev. Carl H. Schultz of the Salem Evangelical Church offers the following discussion on the "Significance of Lent."

It would be well for our age to look at the Lenten season as a period of life; there could be no more opportune time for just such, than during the Season which we have just entered upon.

The Lenten Season is the time when the church, the great fast of the Church, the forty-day period from Ash Wednesday to Easter. In origin it goes back to a very early date in the history of the Church. At first it lasted only forty hours, in commemoration of the time between the crucifixion and the resurrection, but gradually the forty hours became forty-days referring to the forty-day fast of our Lord.

Lent For Today
Never has there been a period in history so much in need of this special consecration as is the present. The fact of fasting we moderns know nothing about, even moderately. We conveniently set this question aside by saying, "there is no merit in foregoing certain activities during Lent, because we only do the same things immediately before and after this Season." I cannot be in sympathy with this content avoidance.

Proper Observance of Lent
Lent is for the spiritual business, just as is the inventory in secular business. No business man, no matter how small, thinks of going on year after year without knowing whether or not his business is profitable or digressing. The spiritual life should be so much more accurately checked. This would indeed also be an inventory: How have we been living? What have we done? What are our actions? Are we trying to deepen and steady our spiritual life? Lent, if properly observed can result in a sinking, at the close of the season, to the same spiritual level on which we began the Lenten season, because Lent is not a season of cold and empty formality, but it is a season of opportunity for learning just where we stand before God, to replenish our depleted stores, to renew our spiritual strength, to cling to attain to a new vision of the Way, to experience the companionship of the Divine Presence, to imitate more earnestly Christ, our Lord, and to deepen our spiritual life, which no one dare question the need of.

Lent and Evil
Do we need to observe Lent? Until there is time taken in the life of every human being to see where he stands with God, we will continue to hear and read of isolation, gross crime, liquor problems which are admittedly too great for civil authorities to control. Strategic legislation may, to a certain extent, hold the baseness of this life at bay, but only a complete reconnection every soul to God will eradicate all that is mean and base.

Will Enlarge Drayton Plains Fish Hatchery

Negotiations for the acquisition of additional land, for a second large expansion project for the Drayton Plains Fish Hatchery were completed this week by the Outdoor Sportsman's Association of Oakland County through its President B. L. Foreman and the way cleared for three additional large rearing ponds to the six large ponds now nearly completed.

The deed was handed to Mr. F. P. Strubaker, of the lands division of the Department of Conservation by Mr. Foreman and opens the way for additional pond areas that will make the Drayton Plains Hatchery near Pontiac, the world's largest blue gill and bass hatchery. The area exceeds 100 acres.

Light reductions in about ten years have substantially cut the cost of Long Distance telephone service.

Further reductions in Long Distance rates became effective January 15th.

Many rates, for calls to points outside of Michigan more than 42 miles distant, are reduced.

All day rates for such calls are reduced. Many night and all-day Sunday rates for such calls also are reduced.

The reductions for the first three minutes range from 5 cents to \$1, depending on distance.

Records less now to do business in distant cities — quickly, personally. It's easier for far-apart friends to keep in close touch.

Sample rates listed in the table below definitely indicate the downward trend during the last decade.
