**IV. WHAT OTHERS THINK**

From actual studies detailed previously it results that the present Michigan has much to do in the matter of roadside improvement because carry on the program of landscape beautification.

Michigan has a great opportunity. Nature has endowed the state with lakes and rivers and a variety of attractive scenic spots. The state has established 67 state parks in all parts of the state and has many beautiful playgrounds for the people and are connected by an excellent system of highways.

Governor Rolph said: "The values which accrue in California from enjoyment of scenery and the accompanying benefits of outdoor recreation are beyond calculation in terms of money. Millions are spent each year to improve the highways of this state. More miles are used both commercially and privately to develop recreational areas. Such sums however are small indeed when compared to the ready opportunity open to each citizen and each visitor within our borders to enjoy the delight of eye and mind offered by an endless variety of scenery or to relax in peace and quiet at a favored beauty spot."

Other national organizations actively supporting the move to regulate roadside advertising so it will not get beyond all bounds are: American Planning and Civic Association; General Federation of Women's Clubs; Isak Walton League of America; National Highway Association; National Conference on State Parks; Women's National Farm and Garden Association; National Council of State Garden Club Federations; American Society of Landscape Architects; American Federation of Arts; American Institute of Architects; American Nature Association; American Scenic and Historic Preservation Society.

One hundred and fifty-eight national advertisers have announced their policy of refraining from roadside advertising but the list of offenders, local, state and national still is large.

Even a driver with crippled limbs is licensed to drive a car fitted with special appliances on a satisfactory showing that he is competent to drive efficiently and safely.
