 mutable law which knows no suspension, she has gone on to the land where there is no death and where "morn shall tearless be". While his own belief undoubtedly included at least the strong hope of a happy hereafter, he nevertheless did not depreciate when he would tell about the Farmington citizen of many years ago who was outstanding as the town athlete. As best it can be remembered the man was a blacksmith—again it "Nate" were here he would provide the name and the man's life history. The striking tale was always told by Mr. Power—with evident respect for the athlete's beliefs—of how the man's mother was buried in Oakwood Cemetery. In his simple language he sketched the story, ending with relating how the man turned from his mother's grave, and while grieving as deeply as the most confirmed believer, demonstrated that he clung to his conviction as he remarked: "Well, that's the last of mother."
 This attribute of respect for the opinions of others was mentioned often in a memorial period in honor of Mr. Power at the Exchange Club meeting Wednesday. Members
