



FULLY PROTECTED by a "hot suit" nearly like those worn by moon strollers, this worker at Sun Steel Treating Inc., Farmington, was partly hidden recently by the size of this white-hot special high speed alloy steel die as it was being transferred from one to another of a series of deep salt bath furnaces. Earmarked for delivery to a midwestern firm for use in cold

forging nose sections of 500-pound bombs, the die was produced from the largest ingot of this kind ever produced by Universal-Cyclops Steel Corp. The die shown above measured 16 inches in diameter and 30 inches long and weighed 1,500 pounds. It took two weeks of processing to harden the metal.

## Festival Parade Slates Seven Outstanding Bands

FARMINGTON Governor William Milliken and U.S. Sen. Robert Griffin have agreed to appear in the seventh annual Farmington Founders Festival Parade on Saturday, July 31.

Also scheduled to appear are Sen. Carl Pursell (R-14), Rep. Raymond L. Baker (R-64), County Commissioner Delos Hamlin and Farmington governmental leaders.

THE PARADE promises to be bigger than previous years, says Festival General Chairman Robert Smith, and will include several outstanding band units.

One of the seven outstanding bands appearing will be The Marauders Senior Drum and Bugle Corps from Madison Heights. The Marauders are the 1970-71 VFW state championship band and will be dressed in the original West Point military academy uniform.

Also appearing will be the Guardsman Senior Drum and Bugle Corps from Flint, first place band winner in last year's Festival Parade, and the Acorn Pipes and Drum Corps from Royal Oak.

Another impressive band entry lined up by the Festival committee is the Townsman Drum and Trumpet Corps, a 70-member band from Leamington, Ont.

The Moslems of Detroit will be represented by the Highland Band, Modern Oriental Band and Moslem Drum and Bugle Corps.

Also expected to appear in the parade are the Moslem Drill Team, Farmington Elks Drill Team, Detroit Police Department's Mounted Drill Team, the car driven by television's "Munster Family," and the "Batmobile."

The parade will begin at 10 a.m. July 31 at the drive-in theatre on Grand River, proceed west on Grand River and south on Farmington Rd. to the assembly point.

AT 11:30 A.M., there will be a special "Pageant of Drums" ceremony in the Downtown Farmington Center. Following the pageant,

trophies will be presented to the outstanding parade entries.

Parade Marshal will be Miss Oakland County Barbara Robbins, a Farmington resident who was a member of the 1970 Festival Queen's Court.

Some 15 floats are expected to be entered in the parade plus some of the fine marching bands of Farmington Schools and many scout groups.

### Bulbs Crowded
