That the City Commission being in accord with the resolutions and program adopted by the Cities Alliance organization for the purpose of reducing the present gas rates, and to protect and aid local citizens hereby expresses its willingness to co-operate with other municipalities of the Cities Alliance as a member thereof, provided that such participation places the City of Farmington under no financial obligation; and that the City of Farmington pay to the Treasurer of the Cities Alliance, the sum of Five Dollars (\$5.00) per month beginning with February and not to exceed six months.
