Glass Known to Ancient Egyptians in 3000 B. C.

The discovery of glass itself is lost in the mists of antiquity, though it was certainly known to the ancient Egyptians as far back as 3000 B. C. But it was not until 1668 that a Dutch spectacle-maker named Lippshey invented the first telescope.

He was examining a second pair of spectacles whilst wearing his own, states a writer in London Answers Magazine, and accidentally brought the two lenses into proper focus, so that a distant church spire suddenly appeared as if it were close at hand.

This new "looking-glass" soon came into the hands of Galileo, where it began to work its magic. In the first place it smashed up the then-accepted notion that the earth was the center of the universe, with the sun, moon, and stars all revolving around it.

Copernicus and others had already asserted that the old belief was utterly absurd and impossible, but they remained as "voices crying in the wilderness" until the telescope gave Galileo the first opportunity of actually exploring the heavens at closer quarters.

Napoleon's Sister. Elizabeth Patterson was born in Baltimore in 1785. She was still in her teens when Jerome Bonaparte, brother of the great Napoleon, married her from France, and induced Jerome, whom he made king of Westphalia, to take another bride. 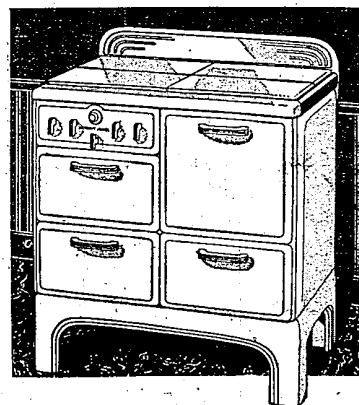

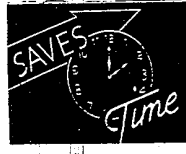

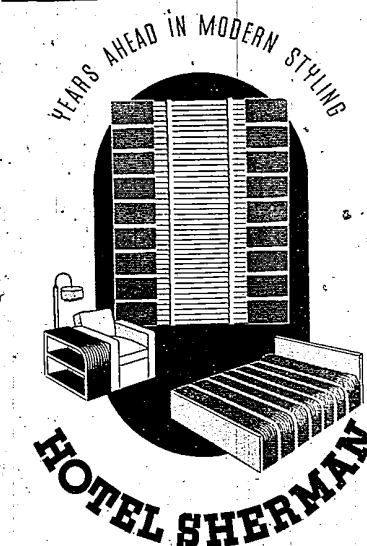
