Mrs. Ada Richardson is visiting at the home of her sister, Mrs. Bernard Banfield.

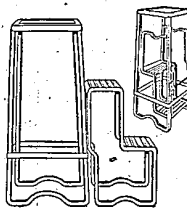
Kenneth and Mrs. Loomis entertained six couples at dinner and bridge on Thursday night.

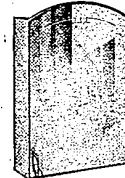
