Adopts New Ordinance

5 Cents a Cop

An ordinance, placing more stringent regulations or, the licensing of peddiers in Farmington is to go into effect May 12, the result of a special meeting of the City Commission held Tuesday morning.

The ordinance deals with license requirements, fees to be paid, and who shall be permitted to engage in a vehding business in Farmington.

Section one of the ordinance specifies that vendors will be obliged to secure a license in order to carry on a business in Farmington.

An applicant for -license must turnish the city clerk with a picture of himself, his address, his signature, and a physical description of himself. In addition, the applicant must be examined by a doctor residing in Farmington and must present a health certificate to the city clerk. This section further provides that the foodstuffs, before being offered for sale, must be brought to the city hall' daily for inspection by the city clerk who shall determine if the goods to be sold are fit for human consumption. The means of conveying and delivering the articles to be sold must also meet with the approval of the city clerk. This man of conveying and delivering the jarticles to be sold must also meet with the approval of the city clerk. If in his opinion, they do-the will issue a certificate to that effect.

en. All peddlers must, on demand of

All peddlers must, on demand of a policeman or other authorized person, exhibit their license and badge and fallure to do, so will be deemed a violation of the ordinance.

Section seven lists persons excepted from the provisions of the ordinance and sets the fees to be paid by such persons and their helders.

City Commissioners may suspend the license without notice, when, in their judgement, it is for the good of the community to do so.
