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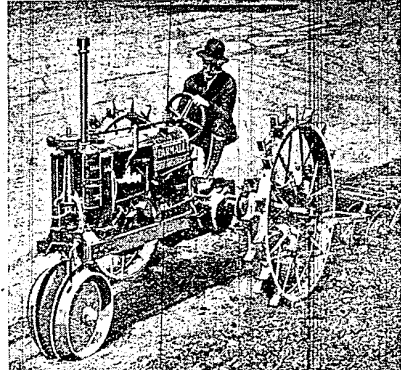

40 N Y A JOBS AVAILABLE IN COUNTY

It is now possible to add 40 young people in Oakland County to the N. Y. A. program now in effect, according to county N. Y. A. officials. At the present time 75 are employed on various kinds of work such as clerical work in county, municipal and school offices, on road and boulevard projects, in libraries and community houses and in nursery schools.

Work is provided on a part-time basis of 56 hours per month. It is possible to establish a project in each community, thus making possible the accomplishment of some civic work in each community and near the homes of the employees, making travel unnecessary.

All youths between the ages of 18 and 25 years, born in the United States or in Canada, who are not in the WPA families, are eligible for this project. Before being assigned to a particular job, an interview is held at which time the educational and work experience of each applicant is obtained as well as his ambitions and desires. An attempt is made to fit him into some phase of the work that will help him attain his objective.

Assignments are made immediately to this project. Applicants can take this up with their case workers or apply directly to the office of the National Youth Administration in the Board of Commerce building in Detroit.

The work of the NYA has been carried on in Oakland County for one and one-half years during which time about 300 young people have worked on the project. It is the purpose of the NYA to furnish work for the out-of-school and out-of-work youth. It endeavors to provide part-time employment for youths of certified relief and WPA families at work-relief projects suited to their abilities and needs, to extend part-time employment to needy college students and small cash assistance to high school students in relief families; to offer vocational guidance, training and placement services to youths; and to encourage the extension of constructive educational and job-qualifying leisure time activities.

State Drafts Road Program With WPA

Murray D. Van Wagener, state highway commissioner, said this week that he is hopeful that 200 miles of gravel trunklines this year will be surfaced with dust-proof oil aggregate.

A cooperative program providing for that amount of money has been drafted with the Works Progress Administration. The commissioner emphasized, however, that the program is contingent upon a number of factors.

For one thing, the program will depend upon the availability of relief labor in the various areas where the projects are planned. Another factor will be the ability of the state highway department to provide about 30 per cent of the construction costs. The approximate participation costs entailed by the program upon the sponsor.

A bill is now pending in the legislature to provide additional construction funds for the department from the revenue from the sale of oil, gasoline, automobiles, and motor vehicle accessories. Under the terms of the measure half of the revenue would be retained by the department and half turned over to the county road commissions. In addition to the requirements under the WPA program, the state highway department is called upon to match more Federal money this year than ever before.

The proposed WPA program also calls for preparation of the base on 300 additional miles of trunkline. This consists in widening the road, building up the gravel surface, ditching, and drainage. The department surfaced 165 miles of gravel roads with oil aggregate last year in cooperation with the WPA.

Advise Preparing Now For Tourist Trade

Farm homes in Oakland county where tourist travel may help bring in additional cash income this summer should be prepared now with paint brush, hammer and even needle, says County Agricultural Agent Karl D. Bailey. Cleanliness is the best attraction outside and within the home for both new and old customers. Attractive signs, attractive landscape and well kept lawns and shrubs are good indicators that a farm family can utilize to label the home as a suitable overnight stop for tourists. Repair work or installation of bathroom fixtures can be completed in better shape if they are done before the room renting business begins.

"Nursing" Trees Cuts Plant Cost

Purchasers who will observe a few simple rules this spring in the handling of young trees and shrubs as they come from the nursery can obtain considerable reduction in losses from new stocks as a result of improved methods of storing, packing and shipping of trees and shrubs now employed by practically all Michigan nurseries.

Even though nursery stocks are packed to reach the purchaser in good condition, a delay of a day or two during a warm spell frequently causes the snugly packed plants to overheat. To prevent serious damage from this source the box or bundle should be opened upon delivery. This is particularly true of roses and strawberries.

Freshness may be restored to shriveled stocks by soaking in water for several hours or even overnight before planting, or by burying both roots and tops for a short time, members of the horticultural department at Michigan State College advise.

"Heeling in" is a good method of keeping stock in good condition. This process serves as a substitute for immediate planting and consists of digging a shallow trench in a sheltered spot, setting the plants at an angle against the shoulder of fresh dirt and covering the roots with soil thrown from a second trench parallel to the first. A piece of burlap or a shovelful of earth thrown over the roots will help materially in reducing losses from drying out of the roots during planting operation.

Plants may be kept "heeled in" for weeks. Some fruit growers secure early starting stock such as cherry trees in the fall of the year, "heeling it in" carefully, and as a result have it ready just when they need it for spring planting.
