

Road Safety Experiment To Be Made

The state highway department and Michigan State Police planned a public safety experiment this week which they hope will pave the way to a sharp reduction in accidents.

Commissioners Oscar G. Olander and Murray D. Van Wagoner announced the first Michigan traffic control plan based on sight distance studies will go into effect July 1 along US112 in Lehigh section in Woodstock and Cambridge townships.

A 45-mile-an-hour speed limit will be established in this area. Traffic will be prohibited from crossing yellow lines at designated locations where sight distances are under 700 feet. State police plan to patrol the area for violations with convictions calling for a \$400 fine or ten days in jail, or both.

Parking will be prohibited adjacent to the road shoulder as another feature. Guard rails will be erected 10 to 15 feet from the shoulder at a dozen locations in the vicinity of filling stations, restaurants, etc. No parking will be allowed between the guard rail and shoulder. Later features will involve the cutting away of banks to improve sight distances, sharp pavement realignments to eliminate sharp, reverse turns, and possibly traffic lights and night lighting.

University of Detroit Summer Session to Open

The University of Detroit summer session will open June 28, continuing through August 6. Registration will be held on June 26.

A total of seventy-five courses will be offered for graduate and undergraduate credit in biology, chemistry, physics, education, English, appreciation of music, art, history, mathematics, French, German, Spanish, philosophy, sociology and religion. Freshman and sophomore courses in engineering are also listed in the summer curricula.

Many of the courses in the summer session may be taken as an adult education program by those interested in broadening their cultural interests without reference to academic credit.

Federal Play Opening Is Postponed

An official communication from Washington stating that no new Federal Theatre attractions may open until July 1 has changed the date of the opening of the "Tragic History of Doctor Faustus," scheduled to open June 23 at the Peoples Theatre, to Thursday evening, July 1. Unusual sets and costumes, designed by Stephen Nastogel, are in readiness and the production, under the direction of Vera Halderne, promises a brilliant climax to the Detroit Federal Theatre's season. Christopher Marlowe's original script has been adapted by Kimon Friar, playwright with the Detroit Federal Theatre.

Chain Stores Drop; State Seeks Cause

The number of chain stores in Michigan, and the number of companies operating chain stores in this state shows a marked decrease in 1937, as compared with 1936, and Leon D. Case, Secretary of State, has ordered an investigation to determine the reasons.

The reduction in chain stores and chain store operating firms, is also noted in figures for chain counters and firms operating them.

On May 31, 1937, there were 6,382 chain stores licensed by the Department of State to operate in Michigan. On May 31, 1936, the number of chain stores was 7,111; the reduction this year is slightly more than 10 per cent. The number of firms operating chain stores shows a reduction of 16.3 percent this year over last, the figures being for 1936, a total of 1,365, with the 1937 total shown to be 1,142.

Museum's Miniature Display Recalls Historic Event of Sixty Years Ago



This three-dimensional miniature display in the Museum of the City of New York, built to scale and correct in every detail, depicts a group of important citizens gathered in the Hotel St. Denis in New York City in the morning of 1871 to hear Alexander Graham Bell lecture on and demonstrate his recently invented telephone—the first introduction of that instrument in New York, where more than 1,500,000 are now in use.

Among the displays in the communications exhibit of the Museum of the City of New York is a miniature three-dimensional group commemorating an important event which took place just 60 years ago. Accurate in scale, complete in detail, and authentic in the setting it recreates, this tiny "still life" represents Alexander Graham Bell's original introduction of the telephone in New York City.

First Telephone in New York
The date of this occurrence was May 11, 1871. The scene which the miniature reproduces so faithfully is a gathering of distinguished citizens in a "gentleman's parlor" in the Hotel St. Denis, then one of New York's best hostesses, located at Broadway and Elerman Street. Among the group were President Bernard of Columbia College, Professor Peet of the Deaf and Dumb Asylum and other important figures. They had met to hear Mr. Bell lecture and demonstrate, for the first time in New York, his speaking telephone.

Lectures Roused Interest in Invention
This lecture was one of a series which Mr. Bell gave in the Spring of 1871, as a result of the interest in the telephone among scientists, educators and others following his successful demonstration at the Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia in the Summer of 1876. These lectures served not only to demonstrate the practicability of the telephone but to supply the inventor with some immediate and welcome cash return for his special invention.

Wires Carried Cornet Solo
Reporting the gathering in the St. Denis, New York newspapers next day recorded that Mr. Bell had managed to demonstrate the telephone simply by stringing a wire between two rooms in the hotel, but


