

Changes Made In Auto Tag Laws

Passage by the legislature of the bill to make March 1st the annual deadline for the purchase of automobile license plates and stickers, with neither the Secretary of State nor any other official authorized to extend this deadline, is believed by Leon D. Case, Secretary of State, to be a step in advance. The present law permits the Secretary of State to extend the final expiration date to March 1st.

call public attention to these two important changes in the motor vehicle law, the Secretary of State also points to the fee of 25c to be collected hereafter for the issuance of stickers or half-year permits. This fee will cover the extra cost of issuing half-year permits. The charging by the state of this small fee appears to be fair and proper, considering the accommodations represented by a half year installment plan for the purchase of a set of plates.

Billy Rose Vetoes Venus at Cleveland's Exposition



BILLY ROSE, whose two mammoth productions are the feature of the new 1937 Great Lakes Exposition at Cleveland, which continues open for 101 days until September 6, rose in his wrath this week and banned Venus de Milos from his 5,000-seat Aquagade. "Even if she had arms I wouldn't

let her in the chorus," shouted Billy. "She'll have to reduce before she can typify the modern American stream-lined beauties who are in my shows. "What I want is a Greek statue that looks like my Mrs. I. Aquabelle, Eleanor Holm Jarrett. Take that fat woman from Milos away—Eleanor can tie her hands behind

her and beat her any day." Rose's other show, the Pioneer Palace at the big 150-acre Exposition which has more free attractions than any other ever held, is headed by Tom Patricola. More than 5,000,000 people will visit Cleveland's big show this summer, many camping in Trailer City there.

Child Training Interests State

Michigan has become one of 14 states with a full time specialist in child development. Announcement of the appointment of Alice Hutchinson on the staff of the extension service of Michigan State College is coupled with a review of the progress and interest in this program since 1929. More than 3,000 families in the Upper and Lower Peninsula were enrolled in phases of child development programs of the extension service in 1936, yet when the work was first started with Mrs. Lydia Ann Lynde, recently resigned, only two counties signified inter-

est in the work. This spring the state has made a record of 15 counties which have completed four years of work and participation.

Tremendous Trifles

POLKA DOT
DO YOU like to wear polka dot dresses, or if you're a man, is a polka dot scarf your favorite article? If so, you can thank two men. One of them was a Hungarian dancing master and the other was an American President. In 1830 that dancing master—history has not preserved his name—was on a walking tour in Poland. In a small village he saw a peasant girl doing a folk dance which pleased him. He gave it the name "Polka" for the land of its origin. Fifteen years later over in America the Democratic party was trying to nominate a candidate for President. There was a deadlock. Suddenly 44 votes were announced for James Knox Polk of Tennessee, who had served as speaker of the house of representatives, but otherwise had a colorless political career. This started a stampede which resulted in the first selection of a "dark horse" in convention history. During the campaign, the Hungarian dancing master's new dance came into this country. Because of the similarity of its name to that of the Democratic nominee, it became the official campaign movement. Articles of various kinds were named for it and for him... and that's why we wear polka dot designs today.

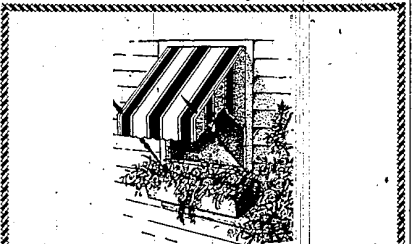
China Moves to Limit Its People to Two Names

It has been common practice for Chinese to have as many names as they please; changing them as their ambitions or state of mind change, but complications which arise in official records have led to a movement for restriction. The ministry of interior has requested a revision of the Chinese civil code to limit each person to two names, an ordinary name, and a courtesy name, states a Shanghai United Press correspondent in the New York Times. One of the most serious difficulties resulting from spur-of-the-moment name-changing arises at election time. Another complication is the refusal of a Chinese to accept a court summons issued in one of his names, which he vows is neither his family nor courtesy name. Many educated Chinese have as many as four or five names, plus a number of literary pseudonyms. Government officials also adopt several names as in the case of General Chiang Kai-shek, the nation's "strong man," who also is addressed as "Chung-chen" by friends who wish to show respect for his position as president of the executive Yuan. The late Dr. Sun Yat-sen, founder of the Chinese republic, still is referred to as "Chung Shan." At birth a Chinese may be named after an animal or bird, or according to his weight, or the order of his arrival in the family. When he enters school he gets another name, his "school name," and a few years later he may adopt some such name as "Tung Kuan" (Conqueror of the World), or "Kuo Liang" (Pillar of the Nation). In maturity and old age his philosophy changes, and so again does his name.

James Cook Discovered Many Southern Islands

James Cook discovered many islands and groups of islands in the South Pacific, some of which now belong to the United States. Cook was born in 1728 at Marton Villages in Yorkshire, the son of a farm laborer. Even as a lad he had other ideas than that of following in his sire's footsteps and tilling the soil of England. At twelve he became apprenticed first to a hatter, then to a cooper, and then to a firm of shipowners of Whitby, engaged largely in the coal trade with Baltic ports. The youth undertook, unaided, the study of navigation, and was well on the way to preferment in the merchant marine when he veered his course. At about twenty-seven, notes a writer in the Washington Star, he voluntarily began all over again at the bottom, shipping as an able seaman in the Royal navy. In the remarkably short space of two years he had risen to the rank of master, or chief navigating officer. In this capacity he took part in the British operations against the French in Canada, and here his association with America began. Although in the St. Lawrence as a naval officer, he undertook a survey of the channel to Halifax, and because of the excellence of his work was assigned to a survey of the Newfoundland and Labrador coasts. His work in this connection attracted the attention of the Royal society, and when, in 1771, that body indicated the admiralty to send an expedition to Tahiti to observe the transit of Venus, Cook was chosen to head the adventure. This was the real beginning of his great explorations.
