

Citizens Training Camp Opens

Young men from all over the state this week started a four week program of citizenship training in the annual Citizens Military Training Camp at Camp Custer. The camp opened Tuesday and the first day was spent in obtaining details and equipment, assigning the trainees to tents and other details of organization.

On Wednesday, after the young men had been given a morning in which to get organized for the training ahead of them, a public ceremony was held in the afternoon in which each member of the camp took an oath of allegiance. This was in no sense a military oath but merely an expression of fealty to the United States and a promise to obey the camp rules and regulations.

Training of the C. M. T. C. is under the supervision of regular army officers stationed at Camp Custer and carried out by reserve officers from Michigan, most of them members of the 38th Infantry, Detroit, commanded by Lieut. Col. Charles E. F. Clark of Detroit.

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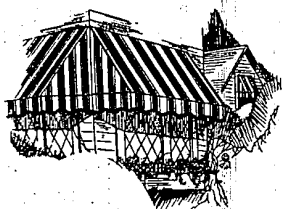
