Annual School Report

OF DISTRICT NO. 9, SOUTHWEST TOWNSHIP

Annual meeting of the Board of Education held at the John Grace school Monday, July 12, 1937.

The following members answered roll call: Joseph W. Doe, secretary; William Harrison, treasurer; L. J. Hamill, president and Ollie Kallman, trustee. Elmer Harlow, trustee being absent.

Meeting was called to order at 8:20 o'clock p. m. with president L. J. Hamill in the chair.

Minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved.

The Secretary read the annual financial report.

Motion by Mr. Kennedy supported by Mr. Charpentier that the expense account be accepted. Carried.

Motion by Mr. Reel, supported by Mrs. Harlow that the receipt account be accepted. Carried.

There being no unfinished business, new business was in order.

Motion by Mr. Charpentier, supported by Mr. Yeager that the board's salaries remain the same as last year. Carried.

Nominations were in order for two trustees for terms of three years each. Otto Esler and Roland Charpentier were nominated. Motion by Mr. Kennedy, supported by Mr. Westbrock that nominations be closed. Carried. Two tickets were cast as well as Mr. Levey to register.

Carried. Votes cast 103—Otto Esler, 52, Roland Charpentier 49, spoiled 2. Otto Esler being duly elected a trustee for a term of three years.

Mr. Kennedy and Mr. Hamill were nominated. Motion by Mr. Charpentier, supported by Mr. Vivian that nominations close. Carried. Votes cast, 97; Mr. Kennedy, 79 and Mr. Hamill, 18. Mr. Kennedy being a salesman for a janitor supply house the board questioned his right to qualify. After some discussion Mr. Kennedy withdrew.

Motion by Mr. Davis, supported by Mr. Charpentier to adjourn. Yea 4, Nay 14. Motion lost.

Nominations were again in order for a trustee. Mr. Mullins, Mr. Monette, Mr. Fall and Mr. Charpentier were nominated. Motion by Mr. Neville supported by Mr. Beckley that nominations close. Carried. Votes cast, 74. Mr. Mullins, 24; Mr. Fall, 17 and Mr. Charpentier, 33. Mr. Charpentier being duly elected a trustee for three years.

It being after 12 o'clock midnight motion by Mr. Doe, supported by Mr. Roston that we adjourn. Carried.
