MANHATTAN ISLAND HAS SOME 900,000 TELEPHONES

One of the most concentrated areas of telephone service in the world is New York City's Borough of Manhattan, where there are nearly 900,000 miles of telephone wire, enclosed in about 2,770 miles of telephone cable. Manhattan has a population of 1,750,000, and about 900,000 telephones, which are connected with each other and with the world through 60 central offices.

Some of these telephone cables contain as many as 3,636 wires, all within a space 2½ inches in diameter. The course of each single wire can be traced accurately through a system of numbering. Each cable is numbered and each wire within every cable is numbered. The cables are in numbered groups, certain groups being assigned to certain central offices, so that it can be determined merely by its number from what central office a cable starts. Each man who supervises repair work has maps showing the complete underground telephone cable system of Manhattan.

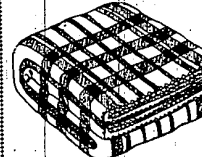
