Merchant Giving Profit To Center

FARMINGTON residents who
plan to sew for the fall season
can contribute to the Far-
mington Community Center in
an unusual way.

On Aug. 14, the Fabric-Go-
Round, located at 24077 Or-
chard Lake near 10 Mile Rd.,
will give 20 per cent of its
gross receipts taken in from
sales that day to the Com-
munity Center.

Irving Lichtman, who owns
and manages the fabric store
with his mother, Mrs. Giselle
Lichtman, has chosen Aug. 14
as an opportune date because
it is a Saturday, when receipts
are higher, and because by
mid-August many women start
sewing for back-to-school or for themselves.

LICHTMAN, who frequently
donates to other or-
ganizations, decided to help
the Farmington Community
Center when he was taken on a
tour of it by Mrs. Alberta
Taylor, executive director.

He noted both how much had
been done and what needed to be
done to maintain the cen-
ter's old, house, used by
hundreds of Farmington
residents.

"They need new carpeting
and heating. It wouldn't hurt if
I gave 20 per cent of a day's
gross receipts occasionally,"
he said. "Maybe other
businesses might catch on.
Once or twice a year... a
certain percent, it doesn't
matter how much." He talked
it over with a board member
of the Community Center who
welcomed his suggestion.

Another Farmington
businessman has also made
plans to donate a percentage
of his receipts on a given day
in September.

"It's a different way to
give," says Lichtman. "It's
been tough for businesses to
give lately because of the
recession but this is another
way. Why not do this?" he
asks with a smile and a shrug.

LICHTMAN, a 30-year-old
former CPA, left his position
as Detroit manager of a New
York accounting firm three
years ago to go into business
with his mother, who has been
in the fabric business for 35
years.

"I made more money as a
CPA but it was a drag. I hated
it. After eight years I'd had it.
I was looking for something
completely different. And I
wasn't a bad CPA, either, to
be honest," he said.

"I got into this business
because of my wife, Doreen.
She loves to sew. Every time I
went to New York I'd bring
her back special materials,
some of them from places
where our firm held accounts."

"Who'd have dreamed I'd
become Oscar de la Renta,
the 'Bag Man'?" he
said. "Since I've been in this
business I've worked so hard—
70 hours a week—but I'm
crazy about it. I look forward
to coming to work in the
morning."

AS A CPA, Lichtman was
accustomed to researching
businesses and this ex-
perience has served him well
in studying fabrics.

"There are so many new
names of fabrics that people
get confused. I like to explain
to shoppers what you can and
can't do with a fabric. You can
sell anything if it's washable
and no-iron, but not every-
thing can be. People should
know what's in the material
before buying it."

"I've never sewed in my life
but I read books on sewing,
and try to help women find the
right material for their pat-
tern, or talk to them about how
to roll a collar. I won't lie—I'd
just get in trouble if I did."

"Nowadays women aren't
sewing just to save money.
They want something spec-
tacular, something smashing.
They want unusual materials,
and that's what I'm looking
for. I go to New York every
four or five weeks, and just
get back from London
recently. It's the quality
fabrics, the novelties, that
women want now. If they're
going to spend all that time on
sewing, they're not going to
spend it on cheap material."
