


Telephone Pole 122 Feet Tall Is Maneuvered Safely on Long Journey

Compared with the telephone poles usually seen along the highways, a pole 122 feet tall is quite a stick of timber, and hauling and piling it is no small feat. A pole of this length was set not long ago at the Forked River, N. J., ship-to-shore radio telephone station of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company as part of the receiving antenna. The pole was one of a shipment brought by water from the Pacific Coast to Newark, N. J., and from there to Lawrenceville, N. J., by train. To

transport it to Forked River, the swivel bolster on a telephone truck was modified to permit wider turns, and a telephone highway trailer was equipped with a rotating bolster, which could be steered in the same way as the rear end of a hook and ladder fire truck. A special permit from the State Highway Department was necessary. Weighing about 7,000 pounds, and with a diameter of 30 inches at the butt, the pole was maneuvered for two days over 45 miles of roads to cover a distance of 47 air-line miles.

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New Licenses To Be Effective October 1

Michigan's new hunting and trapping licenses for the seasons of 1937-1938 go into effect Friday, October 1. The old licenses expire Thursday, September 30.

New licenses may be procured as in the past, from license dealers, conservation officers and regional and district conservation posts. Although the upland small-game hunting season in the lower peninsula does not open until October 15, sportsmen who want to go afield to shoot crows or predators between the dates of Oct. 1 and Oct. 15, are required by law to procure a gun permit for 1937-1938. After September 30 gun permits will be issued by conservation officers only to those who hold the new hunting licenses.

State Farms Face Financial Problems

The problems faced by farmers of Oakland County during the past year are mirrored in the financial statement of the operation of state institutional farms, according to John B. Strange, commissioner of Department of Agriculture. The statement submitted this week by Clarence B. Smith, under whose direction the farms are operated, discloses that operating costs have resulted in reduction of profits from the farms from \$108,708.68 in 1936 to \$75,445.90 this year, according to Commissioner Strange.

Conditions as existing upon the farms, shown in review of financial statement for the past three years, of the farms operated by the state. For the 12 month period ending July 1st, 1935, the farms operated at a loss of \$35,212.23, with total receipts of \$778,988.52, one of the poorest years experienced by agriculture. Increase in livestock prices with increase in dairymen receipts increased total receipts to \$827,210.65. Reduction of operating costs enabled the farms to show profit of \$108,708.68.

Commissioner Strange pointed out despite the fact the farms were often forced to operate upon a different basis than an individual, percentages of cost with operation compare favorably with records of various educational institutions charged with task of compiling farm economic statistics, that the farm cycle of the past three years, 1935 a poor year, 1936 good livestock year with 1937 good field crops year, is clearly reflected by the institution's financial statements.

Seminole Are Citizens
The Office of Indian Affairs says that the Act of June 2, 1924, conferred citizenship on all Indians born within the territorial limits of the United States who had not previously acquired that status. The act referred to is in broad compass and is equally applicable to the Seminoles in Florida as well as to the other Indians "born within the territorial limits of the United States." It is or was not a matter of election or choice with the Indians, says the Philadelphia Inquirer, that citizenship should thereby be conferred upon them whether they desired it or not, and regardless of their individual wishes in the matter.

Record in Judicial Circles
Judge Florence Ellinwood Allen, the first woman ever to sit on a United States Circuit Court of Appeals bench, is the first woman to become an assistant county prosecutor in Ohio, the first to be elected a common pleas judge, the first to preside at the first degree murder trial, and the first in the United States to be elected to a state supreme court. She has been suggested as the first woman Supreme court justice. She is fifty-two years old.—Chicago Daily Tribune.

The Atlantic Coast Line railroad has published a leaflet for its employees regarding personality and the telephone.

Highway Department Plans Road Program

State Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wagener revealed plans this week for black-top surfacing in 300 miles of gravel trunk lines a year.

The commissioner's plans were announced as bids were opened Wednesday on sixteen projects providing for the rebuilding of the gravel base on 122 miles of secondary highways. Incidental grading and drainage construction will also be required.

This work is the first step to be taken by the department for black-topping these roads. The gravel base will be built up to a depth of 6 to 8 inches, depending upon soil conditions, in preparation for later surfacing.

Oil aggregate surfacing will be applied on these roads next spring and summer. This is an improved

type of black top perfected in the laboratories of the department three years ago. Much of aggregate construction has already been carried out by the department in co-operation with the Works Progress Administration.

The 300-mile-a-year program is being financed out of the \$5,000,000 annual appropriation for the department enacted by the recent legislature and Governor Murphy. The funds are to be expended on trunklines that are off the Federal Aid system. By reason of this classification, they have been ineligible for previous improvement the last few years under the cooperative state-federal programs.

Commissioner Van Wagener pointed out that additional gravel road mileage will also be eliminated by concrete pavements. At the present time, there are approximately 3,100 miles of gravel trunklines in the state.


