Safety Club Sponsored by Sec'y. Case to Save Lives

The Michigan Safety Club, sponsored by Leon D. Case, Secretary of State, has inaugurated an intensive campaign in an earnest effort to curb the alarming increase in traffic fatalities and accidents. Through radio programs and talks before parent-teacher's groups and other organizations interested in life saving, Secretary Case hopes to create safety consciousness among both adults and children.

The campaign will be under the direction of Tom Carroll, formerly of the National Youth Administration. Mr. Carroll has had several years experience in developing and directing methods for safety campaigns.

Two weekly radio programs have already been arranged, these being WEXL Royal Oak, at 9:15 a. m. each Friday and WMBC at 4:30 p. m. Fridays.

Children's Program
The WMBC program will be especially for children and a feature will be songs and piano playing of Miss Prudence Butterfield, popular radio entertainer, for many years identified with the "Uncle Nell" and other safety programs. Miss Butterfield, better known to her radio friends as "Prudy" will also assist Mr. Carroll in dramatic features of the program.

In addition to the radio programs, Secretary Case will have capable speakers who will be available for talks before organizations interested in promotion of safety education.

Ten hours of sleep are said to be necessary for boys and girls. Two a. m. to noon will be about right, they will say.

MANY VISIT LONG DISTANCE TELEPHONE HEADQUARTERS

Highway Department Plans Road Program

State Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wagoner revealed plans this week for black-top surfacing on 300 miles of gravel-trunklines a year.

The commissioner's plans were announced as bids were opened Wednesday on sixteen projects providing for the rebuilding of the gravel base on 122 miles of secondary highways. Incidental grading and drainage construction will also be required.

This work is the first step to be taken by the department for black-topping these roads. The gravel base will be built up to a depth of 6 to 8 inches, depending upon soil conditions, in preparation for later surfacing.

Oil aggregate surfacing will be applied on these roads next spring and summer. This is an improved type of black top perfected in the laboratories of the department three years ago. Much oil aggregate construction has already been carried out by the department in co-operation with the Works Progress Administration.

The 300-mile-a-year program is being financed out of the \$5,000,000 annual appropriation for the department enacted by the recent legislature and Governor Murphy. The funds are to be expended on trunklines that are part of the Federal Aid system. By reason of this classification, they have been ineligible for previous improvement the last few years under the cooperative state-federal program. Commissioner Van Wagoner pointed out that additional gravel road mileage will also be eliminated by concrete pavements. At the present time, there are approximately 3,000 miles of gravel trunklines in the state.
