Auditor General Explains Auditing Systems Used

Calling attention to the fact that all county audits made by representatives of his department are open for public inspection, Auditor General George T. Gundry this week explained the methods employed in making these audits.

Under the Central Uniform Act the Auditor General is required to make an annual audit of all counties in the state. The auditors, known as county examiners, work in teams of two men each and under Mr. Gundry's direction examine the books of all county officials. It usually takes a month to complete an audit of an average sized county.

There are seven auditing teams at work in as many counties at the present time. Each group of auditors reports their findings to Mr. Gundry who examines them. After examination he mails one copy of the audit to the county clerk, county treasurer and chairman of the board of supervisors. As soon as they are filed with these officials they become public record and may be examined at any time.

State Office Sets Business Volume Record

The eyes of Michigan business leaders turned to Michigan's capitol today as the Auditor General's Department reached its peak hour in preparation for the tax sale next May.

Auditor General George T. Gundry has organized his force for work on what authorities believe is the greatest single clerical job ever undertaken by a state official. It is estimated by departmental experts that better than nine million entries must be made in the Tax Record being prepared for the tax sale next May.

Work is progressing at an excellent pace, Mr. Gundry stated, though he said lack of housing facilities for his staff hampered them somewhat. It was explained that completion of each county's Tax Record must be completed and in the various county clerks' hands by the opening date of their last term of circuit court previous to May, 1938.

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Conservation Probe Is Promised by Hamilton

Thorough investigation of the state department of conservation has been promised by Rep. John F. Hamilton of Detroit, chairman of a house committee as the result of disclosure of wholesale salary advances made by the conservation commission and kept secret. Revelation of the pay increases was made last week by T. J. Masterson, new commissioner named by Governor Frank Murphy. The action was taken at a session of the commission at the Wimbledon Country Club at Baldwin which was not attended by capitol newspaper men.

"It is not so much a question of whether or not the salary increases should be granted," Rep. Hamilton said, "for certain salaries in all state departments should be increased. But when a commission

charged with the efficient expenditure of public money tries to cloak its actions in secrecy we must entertain some suspicion about its other activities." The same attitude was taken by Commissioner Masterson. "The schedule of pay raises was proposed at the June meeting of the commission and at that time I protested because it was intended that they be granted without public knowledge," he said. "Any business of the conservation commission is going to be a matter of public record so long as I am a member."
