MADE FIRST CALL ON

One of First Phones

On January 28, 1878, when the world's first commercial telephone was installed in New Haven, Conn., one of the original subscribers to the new service was Stone and Chidsey, a grocery store. And in New Haven there lived until recently the man who made the first call over that instrument when it was installed in the store.

Mr. James J. Lawton, whose death at the age of 88, occurred a short while ago, recalled vividly coming to New Haven in 1877 to start an agency for the Fleischmann Co., yeast dealers. He looked around for a suitable location, and obtained desk space in the grocery.

He was very much on deck the day the telephone was put in. He helped the installers mount the telephone, and talked with the men of the central office when the first call was made. Mr. Lawton recalled that transmission was excellent over the crude instrument--"you just talked in a natural tone of voice, although it was a nuisance to change the single transmitter-receiver back and forth between your mouth and ear."

Mr. Lawton found immediate use for the new-fangled apparatus. He used it extensively to check in his delivery men, and sometimes to tell them to make an extra stop when a late order came in. He also urged all his customers to put in telephones, so they could get prompt deliveries of yeast if they needed it in a hurry.
