

SEMCOG Seeks Private Funds

Business interests in Southeast Michigan and the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) should "consolidate relationships" in a mutual support program, says Mel Ravitz, Detroit Common Council President and SEMCOG chairman.

He reported he had urged closer liaison during a breakfast meeting with 40 business community leaders.

Walker Ciser, chairman of the board, Detroit Edison Co., sponsored the meeting.

As a result of the meeting, 200 of the region's larger firms will be asked to contribute \$200,000 in general support funding.

E. ROBERT TURNER, SEMCOG executive director, reported this sum would enable SEMCOG, a seven-county voluntary association of governmental units, to overcome a continuing cash flow crisis.

He repeated problems he first reported to the SEMCOG General Assembly nearly a year ago. These included an unanticipated \$10,000 "add-on" cost to complete the TALUS project, withdrawal of scheduled funding support by Metropolitan Fund, Inc., and withholding of support by a number of local governmental units.

A 25 percent reduction in personnel and other economies has not been sufficient to close the gap, Turner said.

Ravitz cited SEMCOG's programs for utilizing census data, for developing a region-wide solid waste disposal system, and for transportation planning as examples of services of "vital importance to the business community."

Other SEMCOG projects needed relate to environmental protection, drug abuse control coordination, and cable television, he said.

HE PRESENTED a list of 134 firms which have called on SEMCOG thus far this year for information or assistance as indicative of SEMCOG's service capability.

To find regional solutions to regional problems, Ravitz said, there should be "a mutually satisfactory effort by both government and business working in conjunction to at least learn and sort out the facts and, hopefully, to agree upon answers and decisions of lasting import to the people of the region."



OLD GLORY'S 175TH YEAR — The first raising of the American flag over Detroit and what is now Michigan on July 11, 1796 was re-enacted in colorful ceremonies at the City-County Building. Hamilton Hikes Net For Quarter

FARMINGTON Hamilton International Corp., whose principal subsidiary is Alexander Hamilton Life Insurance Co. of America, reported net income of \$508,000, or 7.5 cents per share, for the second quarter of 1971, up 60 per cent over a net of \$318,000, or four cents per share, for the same period a year ago.

Total revenues for the second quarter of 1971 were \$9,160,000, up eight per cent over total revenues of \$8,497,000 in the second quarter of 1970.

FOR THE SIX months

ended June 30, net income was \$728,000, or 11 cents per share, down slightly from a net of \$752,000 for the first half of 1970.

However, total revenues for the first half of 1971 were up about five per cent over the first six months of the year before; \$16,325,000 in 1971 compared to \$15,626,000 in 1970.

Chairman E. Keith Owens said increased revenues from the company's life insurance operations and a "cost reduction program" were responsible for the "substantial gain in net earnings" during the second quarter.

Upon completion of recruit training, she will be assigned to a Class "A" School or shore station for further training in one of the 21 job areas open to Navy women.

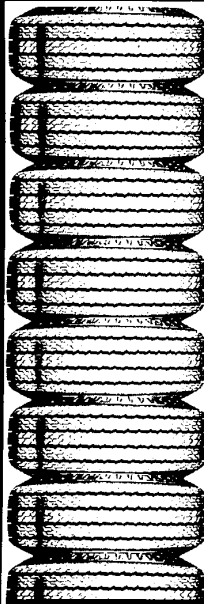

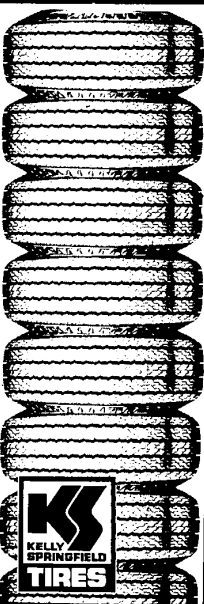
