Snow Removal Work Gets Under Way

The annual fight of man and machine to keep the trunking highways free of ice and snow is now in full swing in Michigan.

Ponderous snow-removal trucks and tractors emerged from summer storage the last few days. Lighter plows bit into the first snowfall of the year. Hundreds of machines dropped chlorided sand over icy pavements.

It's a big order that State Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wagoner has given his maintenance organization. Briefly, it means keeping the 8,300 miles of trunkline roads as free of ice and snow as humanly possible 24 hours a day throughout the winter. It's a \$900,000 service the taxpayers have come to demand.

Reflector Buttons Installed on U. S. 16

Reflectorized buttons on all guard rail posts along US-16 between Lansing and Grand Rapids have been ordered installed by State Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wagoner.

The order means the placing of about 1,500 buttons. As the car approaches a guard rail, the button will be crystal with a red reflection on the guard rail at the left side of the road.

GIFTS INCLUDED AS WAGES UNDER JOB ACT

Prizes, bonuses or other gifts given to workers by employers must be included as a part of their wages and are subject to contributions under the Michigan Unemployment Compensation Act.
