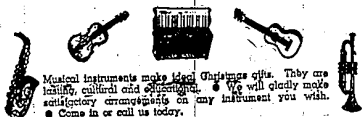

UNEMPLOYMENT
BOARD SETS UP
WAGE RECORDS

Machinery for tabulating wage records of more than 1,300,000 workers will soon be set up by the Michigan Unemployment Compensation Commission in preparation for acceptance of benefit claims to be filed with the commission beginning next July 1.

After July 1, a man who becomes totally unemployed will be expected to file claim for unemployment compensation benefits. He will register at the Michigan State Employment Service office nearest to his home. He will be expected to report at that office as often as requested. If he is willing to work and able to do so, an effort will be made to find a suitable job for him.

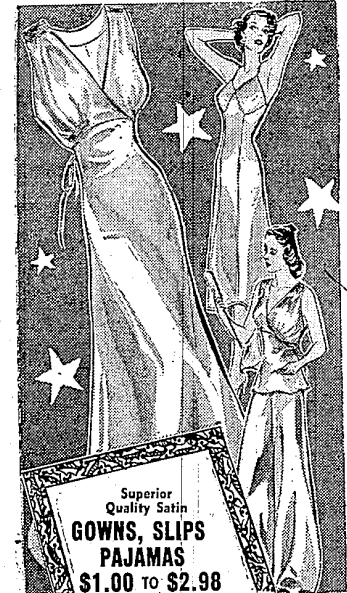
