Duty of Lawyer To Client Outlined

That lawyers who may believe their clients to be guilty of crimes charged against them are not only justified in defending those clients, but in fact have a duty to do so, was asserted Wednesday noon to Exchange Club members by Paul A. Pare, Farmington attorney who spoke to the club.

Mr. Pare pointed out that while a lawyer may believe his client guilty, the lawyer may be wrong and cited cases of innocent persons against whom there appeared to be irrefutable charges, and

where lawyers said afterward that they had believed the accused to be guilty, until absolute proof was found after the trial showing the defendants' innocence. "If the lawyer refused to defend anyone whom he thought might be guilty, many innocent persons might thereby be deprived of counsel," he pointed out.

"The defense of the guilty is necessary in order to protect the innocent, who some time may wrongfully appear guilty," said Mr. Pare.



TELEPHONE BRINGS AID WHEN STEAMSHIP BURNS

Operators in Small Office Handle Flood of Calls—Manager Rips Line for Radio Broadcast

When the steamer "City of Baltimore" burned at Hook Point, just outside Baltimore Harbor, on her way to Norfolk, Va., last summer, another opportunity to be of outstanding service was given the telephone men and women.

The first alarm that the boat was burning had hardly been given to the Armiger central office when Mrs. Eva Hall, agent, and two operators, Miss Judith Dunlap and Miss Louise Phelps, found themselves swamped with calls. Not only were the people in the immediate vicinity making calls, but hundreds of inquiries were being received from Baltimore and elsewhere.

Calls to the Coast Guard, the Orchard Beach Fire Department, and the Riviera Beach Fire Department, and to Baltimore brought a number of ambulances to the beach where the survivors were being brought ashore. Another call to Annapolis obtained the floodlight truck of that city. For hours, the operators worked steadily.

An unusual service was performed by R. E. Wilson, manager of the telephone exchange, in providing a broadcast loop for the use of one of the Baltimore radio stations which wished to broadcast direct from the beach opposite the burning steamer.

With the assistance of traffic superintendent Joseph Seth and commercial superintendent H. S. Boyle, Jr., 1200 feet of twin wire were strung from the end of the nearest pole line to the beach. Within 45 minutes from the time the order was received, the broadcast circuit was ready and working.
