**12-YEAR OLD CONTROVERSY IS SETTLED**

After twelve years of controversy the state of Michigan and the Grand Trunk Western Railroad Company were agreed upon final costs involved in the Woodward Avenue relocation case. An agreement signed by State Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wagoner and Grand Trunk officials provides for the re-payment by the railroad company of \$5,440,101.15 to the state for net advances by the latter in connection with right-of-way and relocation of the railroad tracks. This money is to be paid in equal installments over a 15-year period dating back to 1931—a compromise date.

On the last day of 1937, the Grand Trunk paid \$70,032 to the state which included not only the annual installment of \$24,514.93 due for 1937 but the net refunds totaling \$345,921.99 due for the years 1934, 1935, and 1936. The settlement was accompanied by high praise from Commissioner Van Wagoner for Atty. Gen. Raymond W. Starr and Charles S. Porritt, Michigan Public Utilities Commissioner. Starr, the Commissioner of the Highway Department, continued in active charge of the case after his appointment to the utilities commission.

**DEATH RATE IN MICHIGAN SHARPLY CUT**

Falling death rates, major attacks upon syphilis, tuberculosis and pneumonia, increased health protection for mothers and children, enactment of progressive health legislation and the extension of health services into rural areas of the state have made 1937 one of the most significant milestones in the 65-year history of the Michigan Department of Health.

The general death rate, the infant mortality rate and the maternal mortality rate—all accepted indices of the state of our health—have declined over the past year. Practically every one of the ten major causes of death either remained stationary or showed definite decreases. The estimated death rate for 1937 is 10.55 per 1,000 population, compared with 10.37 for 1936—a significant decrease in terms of the 1,323 lives involved.
