VALUE OF X-RAY IN TUBERCULOSIS IS DEMONSTRATED

Proving the real value of early discovery through X-ray examination provided Michigan people by the Michigan Tuberculosis Association in recent reports covering Christmas seal tuberculosis clinics from September 1932 to January 1933, Theodore J. Werle, executive secretary of the Association, declared this week. In these four months, Mr. Werle said, more than 200 cases of early tuberculosis have been revealed on X-ray films taken with the portable X-ray equipment of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association.

"Reaching 34 counties the Association, with the cooperation of various county health departments has X-rayed 2,258 residents of the state in the four months covered by this report," Mr. Werle reported. "Of 1,612 films which have already been interpreted by tuberculosis specialists, 234 revealed the childhood type of the disease, a stage which can be kept from further development with a few health precautions."

Almost impossible to detect without X-ray is early, childhood type, tuberculosis, Mr. Werle explained. Not until the White Plague is well advanced does the tubercle bacillus give noticeable warning of its presence, he pointed out.

"Most important in controlling tuberculosis is the discovery of the disease in its beginning processes. Every case found early means a material saving in lives and in money," Mr. Werle emphasized. "Through Michigan Tuberculosis Association's program of modern X-ray examination for the disease, many again have been given the opportunity to help control further the spread of the White Plague in themselves and in their communities," he pointed out.

Financed almost entirely through proceeds from the annual Christmas seal sale, the Michigan Tuberculosis Association's campaign for protection from tuberculosis is carried on twelve months of each year. Although funds are necessarily limited, modern weapons of discovery—the tuberculin test and diagnostic chest X-ray—are provided for as many Michigan people as possible.

FORMER MANAGER AIDS IN PHONE EMERGENCY


Restores Connection to Outside World when Flames Silence City's Switchboard

When fire broke out recently in the Eagle Pass, Tex., telephone office, flames licked at the equipment, threatening the entire building. Firemen checked the lines, but they lay behind a dead switchboard, soaked with chemical fire extinguisher, and Eagle Pass was without telephone communication. To make matters worse, the regular repairmen for Eagle Pass were working on long distance lines out of the city and could not be notified.

Mrs. Lisetta Price, chief operator, gazed at the switchboard. There was no connection to summon aid, and no repairman at home. Then Mrs. Price remembered T. A. Stevenson, former telephone manager at Eagle Pass and now retired. Recall-ing the old slogan, "once a telephone man, always a telephone man," Mrs. Price sent for Mr. Stevenson.

He showed he could still meet emergencies. With experienced eyes and practiced hands he went to work to bridge the gap between Eagle Pass and the outside world, and finally established communication with San Antonio. The city of Eagle Pass was again in telephone contact with the world. Telephone repairmen were summoned, and by the next evening, the Eagle Pass telephone office was back in service, with all lines working.

What Every Driver Must Know



DRIVERS' LICENSES

A new drivers' permit law is sketching in Michigan. This article sketches in the highlights of the revised regulations.

Persons operating motor vehicles must carry their licenses with them. Those without adequate driving experience may obtain 60-day temporary permits; provided they pass the required examination. After obtaining needed driving exper-

ience, they take the driving test and get a driver's license upon passing. A licensed operator must occupy the seat beside anyone driving with a temporary permit.

Drivers' licenses are valid three years from issuance date. If you change your name or address at any time, report it to your police station or sheriff, who will enter it on the license card and notify the Secretary of State.
