CHARLES A. SINK NAMES ARTISTS FOR MUSIC FESTIVAL

Announcement of the complete list of artists who will participate in the May Festival of the University of Michigan, May 11, 12, 13, 14, was made this week by Charles A. Sink, President of the University School of Music. Seven celebrities from the Metropolitan Opera, four other distinguished singers, a virtuoso violinist and a celebrated Russian pianist, will be heard. Those from the Metropolitan Opera list will include Marjorie Lawrence, Wagnerian artist; and Hildegarde Buechner, Brunna Castagna, "Carmen" contralto; Nino Martini and Giovanni Martinelli, tenors; Richard Donelli and Chase Baromeo, baritone. Other singers include Marian Anderson, noted American soprano; Arthur Hackett, tenor, head of the voice department of the School of Music; and Hardin Van Deusen, President of the School of Music faculty. Albert Spalding, American violinist will be heard at the Friday afternoon concert; and Arthur Rubinstein, the thunderous Russian pianist, in the last half of the Thursday evening program. The Philadelphia Orchestra, Eugene Ormandy, conductor, for the third consecutive year, will participate in all of the concerts. The Central Union, under the baton of Earl V. Moore, Musical Director of the entire Festival, will sing Rachmaninoff's "Bells" and Bizet's "Carmen"; while the Young People's Festival Chorus, under the baton of Harry Heene, will sing the initial presentation of "John Bunyan" by an American composer, Dorothy James of Ypsilanti, and other selections.

CITY IS GIVEN SAFETY FLAGS BY STATE OFFICIAL

BENNER TAKES POST AS SCHOOL TERM STARTS

John Daley Becomes Detroit's Financial Czar

(Continued from Page One) Mr. Daley in commenting on the capital improvement program said that \$4,200,000 had been appropriated for this purpose in the current budget. How much of the appropriation will be saved the Controller would not say. Daley said a survey would be started at once to see what could be done so that the budget would be kept in balance until the end of June when the fiscal year closes.

The mayor's program includes the postponing of capital improvements mentioned in the current budget, a survey to determine what present improvements could be terminated without sacrificing their value, a curtailing of condemnation proceedings for improvements not already started, a suspension of replacement of present equipment, a limiting of purchase of supplies, a postponing of the filling of vacant and vacated positions and a special effort to reduce the cost of activities whose rates of expenditures appear to be exceeding appropriations during the current year's operation.

NEW MORTGAGE BILL TO STIMULATE HOME BUILDING

Building in and around the City of Farmington should be stimulated greatly by the new mortgage bill passed by Congress this week. Bayard Tupper, manager of the Farmington Lumber and Coal Company said this week.

The new bill increases the mortgage allowance on new homes from 80 per cent to 90 per cent. That is, on a home of \$5,000 value the government will secure a \$4,500 mortgage, instead of \$4,000 as formerly.
