


After the fire which destroyed the Epworth M. E. Church at Brazil, Indiana, firemen found the pulpit, on which rested the Bible, almost unharmed.

LICENSE LAWS HELP MOTOR SALES

In the early days of drivers, license legislation it was felt that such laws might interfere with the sale of cars. Experience shows the contrary to be true. There is every indication that the drivers' license law actually aids auto sales by reducing "sales resistance" due to fear of accidents.
The registration of motor vehicles increased 41 per cent in licensed states between 1925 and 1932. Registrations in non-licensed states rose only 27 per cent.
Automobile manufacturers, automobile clubs and dealers generally now commend the standard drivers' license law as a needed life-saving measure.

NEW LAW SAYS USE OF SEAL IS UNNECESSARY

(Editor's note: Due to an unusually large number of laws affecting both real and personal property, passed by the 1932 Legislature, The Enterprise is publishing a series of articles prepared by Henry T. McGaughey, Oakland County Register of Deeds, and Robert D. Heltsch, Assistant Prosecuting Attorney and Civil Counsel for the County. All the acts discussed in this series, with one exception were passed this year. This is the twelfth article of the series.)

HOUSE ENROLLED ACT No. 47 PUBLIC ACT No. 63 SESSION OF 1932

HOUSE ENROLLED ACT No. 47 Introduced by Representative Watson.

AN ACT relative to the use of seals on instruments affecting real estate.

The People of the State of Michigan enact:

Section 1. Hereafter the affixing of an actual seal, a scroll or device used as a seal, the word "seal" or letters "L. S.", after the signature of any individual executing any deed, mortgage, or other instrument affecting the title to real estate, or any interest therein, shall be unnecessary, and such instruments hereafter executed with or without an actual seal, a scroll or device used as a seal, the word "seal" or letters "L. S." after such signatures shall be construed to be sealed instruments and valid and effectual to convey the legal estate of the premises therein described, and the record of such instrument if otherwise eligible to be recorded, or a transcript thereof, may be given in evidence as in other cases.

Sec. 2. The record of any instrument affecting the title to real estate or any interest therein heretofore recorded which does not show that an actual seal, a scroll, or device used as a seal, the word "seal" or the letters "L. S." was affixed to the original instrument, or a transcript thereof, may be given in evidence as in other cases and shall be effectual for all purposes of a legal record and such instrument shall be construed to be as valid and effectual as if such instrument had been in such respect duly executed.


This act is ordered to take immediate effect.

This act makes the use of the seal, the word "seal" or letters "L. S." after the signature of any person executing any deed, mortgage or other instrument, affecting the title to real estate, unnecessary.

What Every Driver Must Know

OVERTAKING AND PASSING

The new Michigan drivers' license law requires each motorist to pass a test on highway regulations and intersections, unless an officer tells you to. Another safety rule in this connection includes staying in line



when there is a string of cars and not cutting in and out. Drivers on three and four lane highways must keep to the lanes on the extreme right, except when passing.

It also provides that the record of any such unsealed instrument may be given in evidence as in other cases.
