Becoming confused in the traffic, Mrs. Baird left the road and went 1200 feet through a field and over several signs at a nearby gas station. The car turned over and hit a tree and was demolished.

Her husband, Seymour Baird said that in trying to put on the foot brake when his wife became confused, his foot got stuck on the accelerator of the car and Mrs. Baird forced his foot to remain there by placing her foot on top of his.

The car, a 1936 Ford Coach was going about 45 miles an hour when the accident occurred. Mrs. Baird did not have a driver's license. Deputy Sheriff Joseph DeVriendt reports, Mrs. Baird also refused to stay at a hospital for treatment.

FARMINGTON BOYS TO PARTICIPATE IN BOYS' STATE

Two or three Farmington boys will represent the City and Township at the Wolverine Boys' State, incorporated to be held at East Lansing during July.

This project which is being sponsored by the American Legion will function for ten days and will set up a state based on the basic laws of the State of Michigan and which will elect all its state officers as well as national representatives. The state will be, for this ten day period, a 49th state of the union. The Farmington City Commission voted Monday night at the request of the Groves-Walker Legion post to sponsor a boy at the project. The boy's expenses will be paid by the City while he is at the conference.

More than 800 boys will gather to represent the various sections of the State, 20 of which will represent the 17th Congressional District of which Farmington is a part.

The American Legion plans to ask one or two more organizations in the Farmington district to sponsor boys. The boy sponsored by the City Commission will be selected by that organization and will represent the city.

Boys who will celebrate their 16th, 17th, or 18th birthday during the year 1938 will be eligible to be selected. The boy need not be the son of an ex-soldier, nor be connected in any way with the American Legion. Nor does the boy necessarily have to be a student at this particular time, although it is highly probable that a student will be selected.

The boys will receive a good course in American government during their stay at Lansing as well as a knowledge of practical politics. All officers will be elected by the boys themselves. It is possible that the boys representing Farmington might be elected governor of the temporary state or one of the more important state offices. Also it is possible for him to be a state representative or a member of the United States Congress.

The City Commission has not as yet decided what method of selecting the boy, who will represent the city, will be taken, but will con-

AMERICAN LEGION URGES CITIZENS TO CO-OPERATE

The following was sent to the Enterprise by the Publicity Committee of the Groves-Walker Post of the American Legion:

You and the other red-blooded Americans have a great interest in the American Legion. Your ideals and those of the Legion are the same. You have no organization for the concentration of your efforts. The Legion has one, a plan of action, a goal, a strength, and the Legion can, and will, combat the destructive forces so rampant at present. We, together, will preserve this land of ours; keeping it a free-speaking democracy, unopposed by the people; for the people, and of the people.

For you who are not familiar with the Legion and its aims, here is the preamble to our constitution:

"For God and country, we associate ourselves together for the purposes: to uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States of America; to maintain law and order; to foster and perpetuate one hundred per cent Americanism; to preserve the memories and incidents of our association in the great war; to include a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation; to combat autocracy of both the classes and the masses; to make right the master of might; to promote peace and good will between nations; to foster and maintain posterity the principles of freedom, justice and democracy; to consecrate and sanctify our comradeship by our devotion to mutual helpfulness.

There is but one exception to this universal creed for Americans. You all have not the need to preserve the memories and incidents of the great war" that the Legion has. Many of you real Americans are too young to have any recollection of this war. May you never see any war.

You do need to safeguard and transmit to posterity the principle of a just and free democracy, never more now.
