



These Gates Will Greet You at New York World's Fair

TRUCKS AND BUSES

Chauffeurs applying for their new licenses may be asked about regulations covering trucks and buses before being granted the permits. This is in line with the new Michigan license law. This article summarizes the special speed restrictions to chauffeurs will be prepared if the examiners ask about them. These special speed limits apply to trucks and buses and may be changed by the Public Utilities

Commission: 25 m.p.h. for any vehicle weighing more than 18,000 pounds loaded or unloaded; 35 m.p.h. for any vehicle loaded or unloaded weighing more than 5,000 pounds but less than 18,000; 30 m.p.h. for any vehicle or combination exceeding 35 feet long over all. Truck and bus drivers not operating under special Public Utilities Commission regulations who drive vehicles coming within these limits, must abide by them.

PLANNING SURVEY REVEALS SOME STARTLING FACTS

Michigan motorists looked over some startling facts this week in a preview of results from the state's highway planning survey. These results have already caused Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wagner to urge a sweeping revision in the high way finance structure based on the ability of roads and streets to "pay for themselves." He seeks the initiation of a selective highway development program with a distinction between roads that perform a general service and those

that profit the motorists. Survey results list an inventory of 120,111 miles of highways, roads and streets in Michigan—8,111 on the trunkline system, 83,000 in county and rural roads, 15,000 in streets and alleys in rural plats, and 13,000 in urban streets. For the first time, the survey is producing a road atlas of Michigan not only locating every existing road but showing the use made of these roads and their services.

POWELL AND LOY, AND CLAUDE RAINS ARE AT REDFORD

All the average movie goer wants in entertainment is at the Redford Theater Friday through Monday with a dippy farce and a courageous comment on an American social problem making up the bill. The first picture finds Myrna Loy and William Powell married for the seventh time in "Double Wedding," a screen adaptation of Ferens Molnar's play, "Great Love." The picture, which glorifies the house trailer, shows Powell as a vagabond artist, with a flair for dramatics who goes about painting pictures of attractive ladies and drinking beer in Spike's place. Miss Loy is the owner of a smart dress shop who is too busy to fall in love. Furthermore, she insists on her sister, Florence Rice, marrying John Beck. The two oppose being forced into a marriage, although they love each other, and when Miss Loy finds Powell in Spike's place, complications ensue. Miss Loy is horrified that her sister is running around with a vagabond ne'er-do-well, but finds that she is falling in love with Powell herself. The expected climax ends the show.

The second feature is "They Won't Forget," a top notch picture and one of the boldest comments on a modern problem ever to come out of Hollywood. Starring Claude Rains as a shrewd attorney who thinks more of his political future than of justice, the picture throws some light on a problem now perplexing Congress—"mob justice." Although some of the facts are slightly overdrawn, which is one of the rights of dramatic art to drive home points, "They Won't Forget" is realistic and generally unprejudiced.

Two fine pictures, "Alcatraz Island" and "First Lady," the screen version of George Kaufman's stage satire on the government compose the Redford's bill for Tuesday through Thursday next week.

Head of Halibut Flat
The head of the halibut is flat.
