Coral Stone Is Used for Bermuda's Winding Roads

Bermuda is a foreign country with different customs, different currency, different climate and an atmosphere different from that of any American metropolis. Bermuda roads have a special appeal. Made of white coral stone, they wind along the shore line or cut through hills. Typically English, the road builders avoided straight streets, so that there are not half a dozen places on the island where one can see 500 yards down the road.

Isolated and small as Bermuda is, it has a unique background.

Bermuda's parliament was the first representative law-making body in existence, with the sole exception of the English parliament. "Hog" collared, once in circulation there was the first of its kind.
