
Uncle Sam's "Peace Table" at New York World's Fair 1939



NEW YORK—(Special)—Giant steamshovels are tearing away at the soil and hundreds of men are working on the \$\$,000,000 Federal Area for the New York World's Fair whire Uncle Sam will pre-side, figuratively, at a 1939 world peace table that is expected to have a lasting beneficial effect

upon international relations.
Uncle Sam will be represented by a huge Federal Building which will be placed at the head of a Hall of Nations, where foreign countries, 64 of which have agreed to participate, will show their official exhibits at the Fair.
All the buildings will be grouped

around an enormous parade ground which will be the scene of parades, pageants, drills and other colorful events of a like nature, and where many thousands of Fair visitors will gather on opening day to listen to a speech by President Roosevelt. The architect is Howard L. Chenew

This structure, which is now being built under the direction of the United States New York World's Fair Commission, will contain exhibits interpreting the background and functions of the legislative, with the work of the West Pork and White of Maine and government.


