## "CIVIL SERVICE SCHOOLS" UNDER INVESTIGATION

Extravagant claims of so-called "civil service schools" that they are in a position to put their enrollees into a civil service position because they represent or are connected with the government are bringing them under government investigation, the United States Civil Service Commission announces.

Recently the Post Office department issued fraud orders against several of these schools, denying them further use of the mails. Evidence had been submitted that they had used the mails to defraud.

In warning the public not to be misled by promises of government positions by these schools, their agents or their advertisements, the

Commission says no school can fulfill such promises, and cites the following claims as false:

Courses in the schools are required to take the civil service examinations; the schools are given advance information on the examinations; they have influence with the Federal government to obtain employment for applicants; they can get special advantages for those taking their courses; the schools have been authorized by the government to give exams.

The Commission further warns that it is impossible for the government to aid in getting the refund of money paid into the schools and asks the public to cooperate by making inquiry in every case concerning such schools before enrolling for courses.

Anyone can obtain civil service information free from the Secretary of the U. S. Civil Service Board at any postoffice.

On request the Commission will place a person's name on a mailing list to send him notice, without cost, of the next examination held for any particular position in which he is interested.

## Tooth Decay Diagnosed Through The Mails

Tooth decay is being diagnosed and even predicted as long as 12 months in advance for patients who are never seen by the examiner in a demonstration being carried on in the laboratories of the University of Michigan School of Dentistry.

Developed in experiments here several years ago, the process relies on the important diagnostic relationship between the Lactobacilli and the presence of cavities in the teeth, according to Dr. Philip Jay, Research Associate of the University. Believed to be one of the most important factors in tooth decay, he said in a recent interview, this organism is a reliable index and provides an indication of the present and future incidence of caries for an individual patient with an accuracy of over 80 per cent.

In the demonstration now being carried on, known as the Dental Caries Index, samples of saliva from any patient may be transmitted to the Dental School for examination by Dr. Jay and his staff. Some 1,500 such samples from all over the United States have been received and analyzed since last October when the project was begun under the auspices of the Rachman Fund.

## OLD-AGE INSURANCE PROGRAM STARTS SECOND YEAR

The old-age insurance program under the Social Security Act goes into its second year with more than 68,000 applications for participation in the program already received from the residents of Oakland and Macomb counties, Mr. Redman, manager of the Pontiac field office of the Social Security Board, announces.

For the country as a whole more than 37,000,000 applications for social security numbers were filed. Michigan's total exceeds 1,779,000. "As the program passed its first anniversary," Mr. Redman said, "the initial intensive work of assigning account numbers has given way to other activities, there being a marked increase in the number of claims we have been receiving for lump-sum payments under the Social Security Act."

## Dance Group Will Close Town Hall Season

Miriam Marmelin, American dancer and her group will close the Detroit Town Hall season at the Fisher Theater Wednesday morning, March 23. Miss Marmelin, who was discovered by Maurice Browne, producer of "Journey's End" and co-author of "Wings Over Europe," has created more than 200 dances and pantomimes and is a nationally known dance instructor, writing articles and giving radio lectures in addition to directing classes.

## LEGION STRESSES IMPORTANCE OF NATIONAL FLAG

The publicity committee of Groves-Walker Post No. 346 of the Farmington American Legion submitted the following article to the Enterprise:

You will now go further into the Legion flag education. In 1794 Vermont and Kentucky were admitted to the union, and the number of stars and stripes was raised to 15. As other states entered the union it became evident that there would be too many stripes. In 1818 Congress declared the number of stripes to be reduced and restricted to 13, representing the 13 original states, while a star would be added for each succeeding state. That law is the law of today.

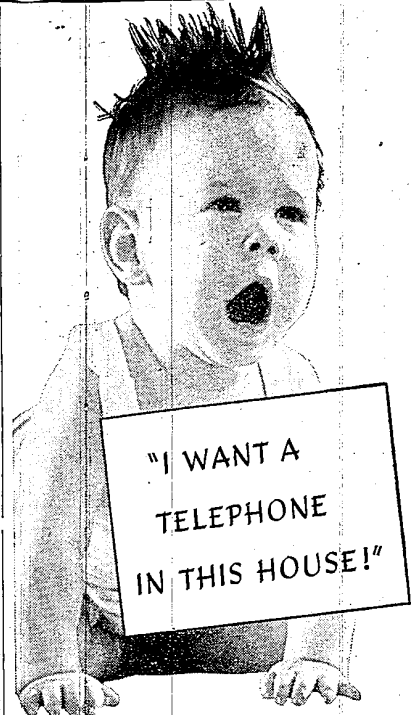
The name "Old Glory" was given our national flag August 10, 1831, by Captain William Driver, of the Brig Charles Daggett. The flag was first carried into battle at Brandywine, September 11, 1777. It first flew over foreign territory, January 29, 1878 at Nassau, Bahamas Islands, Fort Nassau having been captured by the Americans in the course of the war for independence. The first foreign salute to the flag was rendered by the French admiral La Motte Piquet, off Quiberon Bay, February 13, 1778.

The United States flag is unique in the deep and noble significance of its message to the entire world—a message of national independence, of individual liberty, of nationalism and of patriotism. It symbolizes the popular sovereignty of America. It is not a flag of a reigning family or royal house, but of you and the American Legion. 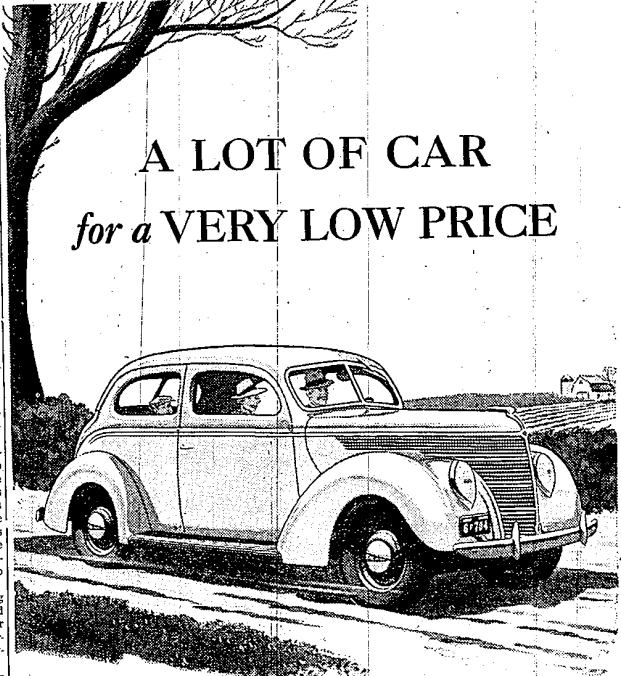
