

Merchants Will Open League Play With Inkster Sunday

With all practice games out of the way, the Farmington merchants team is ready to open the 1938 season of the Inter-County League Sunday against the strong Inkster nine on the home diamond. The game is scheduled for 2:30 p. m. with Mayor Howard M. Warner throwing the first ball. City Clerk Harry Moore is getting in shape to catch the Mayor's toss.

The Farmington nine hopes to be a strong contender for the league flag against the 15 other teams in the revised circuit. These include Plymouth Perfection, Plymouth Schrader, Belleville, Detroit Ace of Clubs, Northville, Cass Benton, Garden City, Wyandotte Merchants, St. Stanislaw, Wyandotte, Trenton, Ypsilanti, Hamburg, Whitehead and Kales, both of River Rouge and the River Rouge Business Men's nine.

Two Sections

The league will be run on the Shaughnessy plan, being divided in two sections with a champion-

ship play-off at the end of the season.

Inkster has a good club this season and is expected to take Farmington in stride. Gus Rosenboom will pitch for the home team with George Metzger catching. The rest of the lineup will be decided Saturday, H. F. Brennan, manager, says.
