**MICHIGAN DOCTOR  
DISCUSSES WHITE  
PLAGUE FACTS**

For generations tuberculosis has been one of the most widespread diseases of mankind. Dr. John Alexander of University Hospital declared this week in a discussion of the disease. A member of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association's board of trustees, Dr. Alexander said that though proved facts regarding tuberculosis have been placed constantly before people, they have, until recent years, held tenaciously to the old beliefs.

"Probably the most often disputed phase of the White Plague has been its true cause. Despite absolute proof that the disease is caused by a germ, the tubercle bacillus, many have persisted—even to the present day—in the old hereditary theory. Many who knew that tuberculosis claimed one after another member of single families thought that the disease was passed from parent to child by reason of birth.

"An almost limitless source of reliable information regarding tuberculosis has been, and is, the Michigan Tuberculosis Association. Honest reporting of fact and a sincere desire to educate young adults in Michigan about the disease most deadly to them is an aim of the Association."

Today, public health knowledge includes the tuberculin test and diagnostic chest X-ray. It was explained, though, that only within the past few years has the general public begun to request examination for tuberculosis by means of these modern medical weapons.

"Knowing that tuberculosis is, as is any highly-infectious disease, the Michigan Tuberculosis Association spreads word of its cause, treatment, and control during twelve months of each year.

Michigan people, through their use of tuberculosis Christmas seals make possible the Association's extensive campaigns of health education and case-finding."

Authorities on current events will include Stuart Chase, economist, speaking on Mexico; Sir Ronald Storrs, former military and civil governor of Jerusalem, on "The Problem of Palestine"; Eugene Lyons, author of "Assignment in Utopia," speaking on Russia; Mrs. Lilian T. Moore, wife of Edgar Ansel Mowrer, noted foreign correspondent, and author of "Journalist's Wife," discussing the Hitler aggression in Central Europe, and Felix Morley, editor of the Washington Post and Pulitzer prize-winner for his editorials, on the Pacific crisis.

**NATIONAL SCOUTS  
TO HONOR  
FAMOUS LEADER**

Daniel Carter Beard, National Scout Commissioner and chairman of the National Court of Honor of the Boy Scouts of America, will be eighty-eight years old on June 21. His fame as an outdoorsman and as a friend of boyhood extends beyond the bounds of his own country, and in his honor, several thousand Boy Scouts will make pilgrimages to his home at Suffern, New York, on Saturday, June 8, to pay him honor.

In a month the place where he lived where exercises will be held with a minimum of speeches. Scouts will pitch their tents and each group will be given an opportunity to share in the outdoor pageants that will mark the day.

The National Executive Board of the Boy Scouts of America, appointed Col. Theodore Roosevelt as Chairman of a special committee to arrange the celebration, and Walter W. Head, President of the National Council, hopes the gathering will be "the biggest thing of its kind which has ever taken place in Scouting."

Known To Millions  
Mr. Beard, or "Uncle Dan" as he is better known to millions of boys, was a leader in work among boys for many years, and he is still at it just as keenly and vigorously as ever. He is a regular contributor to "BOYS' LIFE," the magazine published by the Boy Scouts of America for all boys. As a pioneer in activities for boys he was a member of the first Executive Board of the Boy Scouts of America, elected in 1910, of which there are two other members still serving, namely, Collis H. Livingstone of Washington, D. C., who was President of the Boy Scouts from 1910 to 1925; and William D. Murray of Plainfield, N. J.

**TWO CITIES PLAN  
INTERNATIONAL  
BRIDGE PROGRAM**

Sarnia, Ontario and Port Huron, Michigan, soon will be linked by a river bridge 120 feet, will be joined by the Blue Water bridge across Saint Clair river on the direct Chicago-Montreal highway.

In a month the main span of the great cantilever span, which tops off the river by 120 feet, will be joined over the center of the river. Construction work is rapidly advancing from both sides of the stream.

Both cities are uniting in plans for the greatest celebration in their history. The bridge has 100 years with several hundred thousands to view the dedication exercises and Blue Water Carnival to be staged for four days.

President Roosevelt has stated he expects to take part in the dedication along with Michigan members of Congress, Governor Murphy and other State officials, members of the celebration committee report.

Ready About May 30  
Canada will be asked to send a number of its highest officials to represent the Dominion in the dedicatory program.

The linking of the two halves of the main span over St. Clair river about May 30 will be broadcast in a half-hour program from the bridge scenes by land, air and water over a number of stations.

The bridge is being built by Michigan, Ontario, Dominion and United States governments. The State Bridge commission of Michigan was created by the Michigan legislature in 1935 to build, maintain and operate the structure.

The commission now operates ferry service between Port Huron and Sarnia and will continue this service after the bridge is opened

for commuters not travelling in automobiles.

**STATE REPORTS  
ON BARBERY  
ERADICATION**

Michigan's 19-year old barbery eradication program for the prevention of black stem rust will pay large dividends this year, according to the annual report of Francis B. Powers, associate pathologist of the United States Department of Agriculture, in annual report to Commissioner John B. Strange of Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Unusual conditions last year caused the spores to be blown into Michigan from the southwest, causing wheat crop in the southern tier of counties in Michigan to test between 50 and 55 pounds to the bushel.

Since the start of the campaign over one million bushes and five million seedlings have been eradicated, with work performed in every county, with the result that rust spores, carried into Michigan in 1937 will not live through the year, to again infect wheat in 1938, according to Powers. Michigan's wheat history has been 216 percent over the previous five years, the annual report discloses.

Summarizing the work for the state, Powers says, that 3,257 miles were covered, 19,552 man days expended, and a total of 29,195 harmful barberries eradicated. In Oakland County 149 square miles were covered, the man days numbered 632, and 43 seedlings and bushes were eradicated.

One of the largest growths of barberries found in Michigan during the past year was twenty miles from town and nine miles from

traveled road at the edge of the cabin which belongs to the late James Oliver Curwood. The location was discovered by County Agricultural Agent, G. S. Diekhof of Baraga County.
