Why Voters Must Register With the rise of large cities following the Civil war and the increase of immigration, election frauds became rampant. As early as 1800 Massachusetts enacted a registration law which was designed to prevent illegal voting as well as violence at the polls. The other New England states followed the lead of Massachusetts within a few years, but outside of this section all of the states adopted some form of registration of voters, though in a number of states the requirement was limited to cities.

Decorating Clock Dials It was not until late in the Seventeenth century that cast figures and chased work appeared on clock dials. The engraving on clock faces and the brass plates on the back was beautiful and artists were frequently employed to decorate them. Early in the Eighteenth century the makers began to inscribe their names on the dials, and it is at this time that Latin proverbs began to appear.

Hawaiian Lei Serves as Expression of Good Will The Hawaiian lei is an inexpensive ornament in general, but it may be made magnificent with rare and exotic blooms serving as the background of the wreath of fragrance, most of the flowers of which may be plucked from any garden. Some of the leis are made by florists but those worn by the residents are usually made at home, and much imagination and ingenuity are employed in the construction of the designs. Some blossoms are placed in their natural state in the floral rope while others are opened wide and spread over the background of soft ferns, all being laced together and strung to the thread that supports the wreath. The design may be a gracefully formal one or a haphazard riot of color. The lei, as a garland of flowers, had its origin in the welcome to the spring and serves as a token of friendship and general good will. It is appropriate to almost any occasion, and is often used as a table decoration, replacing the customary vases of dimer flowers. Its spirit of hospitality and its wide-spread use is one of the most delightful customs of the Hawaiians. Hawaii as a meeting place of East and West, where the races of the Orient and the Occident have formed a unique civilization, has long held a fascination for world travelers.

Gloves of Long Ago Had a Variety of Meanings

There is amusement in tracing the names of some of our most familiar and necessary articles of clothing. Take gloves, for instance. The word gloves is said by some writers to be derived from the Belgic, gheolve (faithfulness) because gloves were a testimony of faith, or from gifu, since gloves were so often gifts of love.

Another ancient writer thinks the word might come from goe, the hand, plus the Anglo Saxon "ober" meaning over, because they were worn over the hand. A more modern authority says it is from the Gallic cell, to cover, and lamh, the pronounced cell lay or klav and then glove.

Wherever the name came from the indisputable fact remains that gloves must have been in use when England was in its infancy, and were worn either for warmth or protection, observes a writer in the Montreal Herald. Once the ceremonial of gloves was so elaborate and general that every grade of society was in some measure under its rule. Gloves protected the business of merchant or peddler. They were a general pledge of security. Gloves conveyed defiance from one king to another. They had also a tender meaning and were chosen as a token of faith between lovers. On the bench, in the court of laws, they denoted probity. In the church the glove denoted purity. A knight wore a dainty glove in his helmet to remind him of his absent "dearling." And of course ladies of the haute monde wore the most entrancing and enchanting gloves imaginable.

Ring of Pancake Bell

Ancient English Custom There are places in Britain where the quaint custom of ringing the "pancake bell" is observed to call the local people together to confess their sins, or to be "shriven," as our forefathers used to say. To many people, however, the church bells at Shrove-tide are merely a useful reminder to start trying their pancakes, states a writer in London Answers Magazine.

At Davenport the "pancake bell" is known as the "Pan-burn bell," whilst at Maidstone, Kent, it has been called the "Fritter-bell."

In the days of Merrie England all kinds of sports, carnivals and picturesque customs prevailed at the time just before the Lenten fast period, and Shrove Tuesday was observed as a holiday by all apprentices. Among the most popular pastimes were football, bull-baiting and cock-fighting.

There was also the strange and somewhat brutal custom of making cocks and hens the target for stones thrown by competing farmhands and other country merry-makers. In this connection there is an interesting record of an outraged hen which suddenly spoke with a human voice and severely reprimanded its cruel tormentors for shying stones at it.

Before the astonished crowd could answer this startling but just accusation, the "human" hen collapsed and died at its master's feet—or so we are told.
