bruises and injuries, and Mrs. Nevans, 32, received several fractured ribs.

The front and left side of Adler's car was completely demolished, and the entire right side of Nevans' auto was smashed.

Cars Trip Over

Following the crash Nevans' car tipped over and Adler's car turned around once before tipping over. An ambulance from Redford took the injured people to the Redford branch of the Receiving Hospital. Pictures of the demolished car and the intersection were taken by Deputy Sheriff Joseph DeVriende.

Robert Gerds, who lives in the vicinity of Halsted and Twelve Mile Roads, suffered a broken right leg, a fractured collar bone and cuts on the head, as the result of the collision at Walnut Lake and Orchard Lake Roads Friday night at 9:50.

A car driven by Herman Gerds, uncle of the injured boy, collided with one driven by Louis Remus, 25, of Detroit, Miss Molly Katcher, 20, of Detroit, a passenger in the Romer car, suffered a badly cut eye. She was taken to the Pontiac General Hospital for treatment.

In a third accident in this vicinity a car driven by Phillip A. McCann, 29, of Ann Arbor collided with an auto driven by Alexander Austin, 20, of Lansing, Saturday at 10 p. m. on Orchard Lake Road, south of Eleven Mile Road. The front and side of McCann's auto and the left side of Austin's car was severely damaged.
